THE POWERS WILL
CONFER SHORTLY

Macedonian Reforms May
be Demanded by the
Porte.

PROVISIONAL MEASURES

BERLIN, Monday—It is semi-officially announced that an exchange of views is proceeding between the Powers on the basis of the Anglo-Russian Memorandum of Understanding. The decision on the matter will be come to at a meeting of the Ambassadors, which is to assemble at Constantinople the latter part of this month. Whether or not a further Collective Conference, presenting the wishes of Europe will be held, is still uncertain. There, will depend upon the attitude taken up by the new Turkey on the question of Macedonian reforms. In view of recent developments and the probability of the Ottoman Government in London, its own desire in order to settle the discussion, it is probable that the Ambassadorial conference may be looked upon as provisional measure.
