C. Williams and Behrman Made 1178.

Large Crowd of Toronto Bowlers Here.

Yesterday's Scores at C.B.A. Tourney.

Yesterday was Toronto B. C. day at the Canadian Bowling Association's tournament at the H. B. and A. C. alleys, and the Queen City made a good showing numerically. About 150 trundlers and friends, accompanied by a band, came up on a special train. They were met at the station by members of the local club. Haaks were provided for the curlers, and a street parade took place to the alleys.

No less than 28 teams rolled in the novice event, 26 of these being from Toronto. In the doubles 21 teams rolled, and 17 men took part in the single competition. The Toronto News' team had a glorious chance for first honors in the novice five-men event, being well over the 800 mark in the first two games, but they blew up in the final string, only getting 694.

The London Ideals and the Windsor B. C. were the two teams that rolled in addition to the Toronto bunch. In the doubles Behrman and Williams, of Toronto, made sure of a prize with their high score of 1,178, and were prevented from reaching the 1,200 mark by two bad splits, which Williams fell into on his second string.
