Fruits And Vegetables For Family Of Five

According to a recent announcement
certain nutrition specialists of Cor-
nell College of Agriculture, are work-
ing on a canning budget that will
serve as a guide for the amount of
canned fruits and vegetables needed
to keep a family of five well nour-
ished for a year.

The budget recommends the use
of tomatoes four times a week, green
vegetables six times, starchy veget-
ables three times, and fruits ten
times a week. The quantities of food
such a family might well use are
about 80 quarts of tomatoes,
120 quarts of green vegetables, 50
quarts of starchy vegetables, 220

Because of the presence of anti-
scorbutic and water-soluble vitamins
the budget says, tomatoes are pro-
vided in quantity, but the use of or-
anges at certain seasons of the year
may somewhat decrease the amount
of tomatoes used. Either oranges
or tomatoes are desirable for children
throughout the year.

The amount of vegetables stored,
it continues, such as cabbage or
celery, affect the quantity of green
vegetables provided by the canning
budget, and the amount of fresh
or dried fruits such as apples, prunes,
and oranges used during the year.
Just also be considered in estimat-
ing the amount of fruit to be canned.

MAJORITY OF 50 FOR BONAR LAW

France Worried Over Speculation In Exchange

The committee on speculation of
the Chamber of Deputies heard a
statement of Jean V. Parmentier,
director of the movement of funds
of the Ministry of Finance, in regard
to measures to prevent evasion of
capital and speculation in exchange
through the purchase of foreign
money and foreign securities.

The members of the committee dis-
cussed the possibility of organizing
an exchange office to centralize the
control of all operations in foreign
exchange. It is probable that the
committee will report to the Chamber
in favor of legislation creating such
an office.

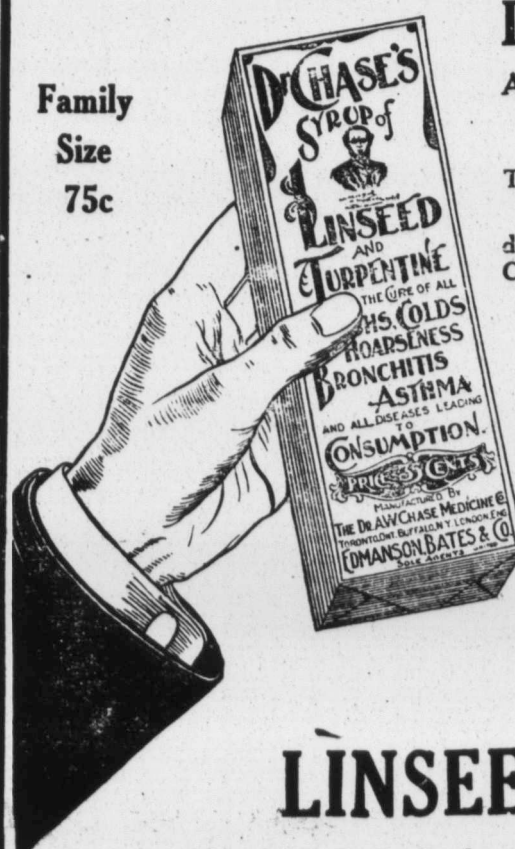
