

Local and Other Items.

Mrs. Walter Ellis of Malahide, Ont. was burned to death as she was in the act of mixing some varnish on the stove.

The known dead, reported dead, and the missing in Louisiana and Mississippi as the result of Wednesday's hurricane now number 549. Property damage twelve millions.

Declarations for the different districts of the three Counties have been held by the respective sheriffs thereof, and all the members were declared elected, as at the close of the polls on election day.

Three men were burned to death and seven firemen injured, three of them seriously, in a fire which destroyed the livery stable of Christ Rhein at Elizabeth N.J. Saturday. The three men killed were employees of the stable, who were asleep in the loft.

The publication or sale of any photograph or drawing of anything in the British navy will henceforth be a penal offence. An Admiralty order to this effect will remain in force during the continuance of the war has been issued.

The Dutch newspaper Dagens Nyheter, on the authority of a business man who has just returned from Germany, says that a great explosion occurred in an ammunition factory at Wittenberg, Prussia, on August 23. Two hundred and forty-two workmen were killed and many injured.

Application for a recount has been made to his Honor Judge Stewart of the Queen's County Court, by Mr. John S. Cousins against Mr. A. C. McNeill, Conservative member elect for the first district of Queens County. The hearing is set down for this afternoon.

It is reported from Ottawa that the following changes may be made in the Dominion Cabinet: Hon. Pierre Blondin, Minister of Inland Revenue, to become Secretary of State in succession to Hon. Louis Coderre. He will in turn be succeeded by Mr. E. L. Patenaude, of Montreal. Mr. Coderre to get a Montreal judgeship.

Rt. Rev. Bishop Morrison of Antigonish and Rt. Rev. Bishop McNally of Calgary, both Islanders, have been here on brief visits, within the past week. Bishop Morrison arrived here Thursday evening last, and Bishop McNally Saturday evening. They were guests of Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Leary, at the Palace, while in the city.

A British staff officer says the Prince of Wales had a remarkable escape from death at Loos. He was speeding towards the front in an auto and left it to mount a hill for a view of the battle. A shell hit the auto, destroying it and blowing the driver to pieces. When reproached with running into danger, the heir of the throne said: "Well, I have plenty of brothers."

The Anglo-French financial commission announced on Sept. 28, that the proposed credit loan to Great Britain and France \$500,000,000, would be issued on joint Anglo-French five year five per cent bonds offered to the public at 98, and to the syndicate of underwriters at 96. It was announced also that the bonds would be issued in denominations as low as \$100 and that subscribers might pay for them by instalments.

The dwelling house and barn of Mr. Michael McDonald, Afton Road were burned to the ground on Friday night last. A defective flue is supposed to have caused the fire. The family had a narrow escape all being in bed at the time. The fire was discovered by Mr. McDonald who was awakened by the crackling of the burning wood. He immediately rushed upstairs, where three small children were sleeping and got them out only in time to see the roof crash in after them. With the exception of having saved some of the furnishings from the lower part of the house all is a total loss and much sympathy is felt for Mr. McDonald.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intestate homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$200 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required a homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
