League Football

St. Bon's Defeat Feildians 3 to 0.

A fair audience greeted the St. Bonaventure's and Feildian College teams in the League Football Match, at St. George's Field, last evening. A southerly breeze blew and the evening was cool and favourable to good play. The teams lined up:—

Feildians—Lush, goal; F. Rendell, H. Rendell, backs; R. Rowell, C. Hunt, Jeffrey, half backs; C. H. Dickinson, P. H. Rendell and C. Carter, forwards.

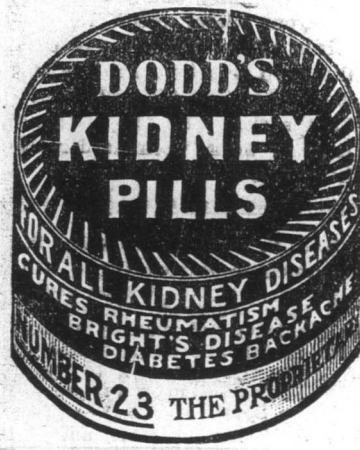
St. Bonaventure's—G. Byrne, goal; J. O'Flaherty, W. Firth, backs; J. Rawlins, W. Hearn, M. Power, half backs; R. Callahan, S. Shortall, L. O'Dea, H. Meenan and Templeman, forwards.

The Feildians winning the toss defended the western goal with a breeze in their favour, and for the first 10 minutes of play nothing of exceptional interest occurred. Hands were then given against St. Bon's, who had a run up field and secured a corner which, however, was badly placed, when Dickenson got the leather down field and Byrne saved a good shot sent in by him. Carter then made a good try from a foul, the ball rebounding from St. Bon's goal post. St. Bon's now made a dash forward and worked the leather up the wing when Hubert Meenan passed all opponents and banged the sphere into the twines, scoring No. 1 for St. Bon's, 20 minutes after the kick off.

Repeating the St. Bon's again worked it west and Callahan found the net but was "off side."

The Feildians now put on steam and P. H. Rendell shot for goal but their aim was erratic, and off a foul throw by the St. Bon's, the ball was again shot for their goal but one of their backs headed it out of danger. The St. Bon's, now put up some fast play and made several attempts to score, when the B. F. C. made a dash down the field and Hunt sent in a hot one from the wing landing it in the twine but was ruled "off side."

Slowly working the sphere west H. Meenan again gained control of it and passing all the opposing team and shot goal No. 2 for St. Bon's, and one minute before, Referee Higgins whistle sounded half time, and amidst



intense applause. The teams now crossed: St. Bon's, 2 goals; Feildians nil.

SECOND HALF.

With a rush east the boys in blue and gold rushed on the Feildian territory and Lush was kept busy saving for a while, and the Feildians retaliated by a determined rush up field but met stout resistance from the St. Bon's backs; they again got the ball down field when Callahan rushed it along the wing and shooting near Lush and secured the third and last goal for St. Bon's.

Several times the B. F. C. boys tried hard to retrieve their fallen fortunes and bombarded St. Bon's goal but erratic shooting and a good defense nullified their attempts at scoring. The forward line of the B. F. C. now seemed to weaken considerably and the St. Bon's lads threw more vim into their work; corners were conceded to each in turn and a long while St. Bon's continued to assault their opponents' goal, but like them earlier in the game wild shooting prevented further scoring and the shooting white sounded: St. Bon's, 3 goals; Feildians nil.

The Birbeck Bank at High Holborn which withstood a run on it last fall caused by rumours that the institution was in trouble, suspended payment to-day. The directors estimate the deficiency at \$1,875,000, but accretions think \$3,750,000 will be nearer the mark. The total liabilities of the Bank are \$34,380,910. The Official Receiver has taken charge. A petition asking that the affairs of the Bank may be wound up, will be presented to the Court, with a view to reorganizing the Bank.

LONDON, June 8. The May statement of the Board of Trade shows a decrease of \$6,499,506 in imports, and an increase of \$20,375,500 in exports. Raw materials and goods stuff show the largest increase in imports, while the principal increase in exports was in manufactured goods, to which common textiles contributed over \$10,000,000.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 8. News is brought by steamer of the annihilation of a Japanese force in Formosa, by the rebels, against whom the Japanese have been campaigning during the last three years. Three tribes, which made peace, were incited to fresh rebellion by two tribes which remained obstinate. Forty men of a force sent against the Formosans were ambushed. After fierce fighting ten escaped. The mutilated heads of the dead were carried off by the head-hunters.

Owing to other engagements a large number were unable to attend. The pieces, practised included "Rule Britannia," "Land of Hope and Glory," "God Save the King." Another rehearsal will be held next Thursday night when 250 members, including the Brigade Bands, will take part, and will take their stand on a platform erected in the centre of the Rink for their accommodation. Mr. C. Hutton is conductor.

"The Ninth of June."

This is the anniversary of the great fire which swept St. John's in 1846, just 65 years ago. It started in Hamilton's cabinet maker's shop and burned the town to the eastward, stopping at Maggott's Cove, near Holytown. The fire burned for three days, two soldiers were killed while blowing up buildings to make a fire break and thousands were rendered homeless. The monetary loss was up in the millions.

Mattresses Aloft.

Mr. Cormack, of the Customs Department, yesterday had a message from Mr. R. Furneaux, the sub-collector at Rose Blanche, to the effect that fishermen at Pelites had found several mattresses on the fishing ground there Tuesday. There were others, which the men could not take. The painting is the work of Mr. Henry Bradshaw of this city, and has been pronounced by art critics as perfect as its kind. The B. I. S. paid Mr. Bradshaw \$250 for the picture.
