### Borden Submits His Cabinet.

According to a message received by us this morning, Mr. Borden submitted the names of those he proposes to sit with him in the Dominion Cabinet to His Excellency, Earl Grey, last night. He also set forth the portfolio he wishes to be assigned to those taking departments.

Mr. Borden himself will be Premier and President of the Council, just as Sir Wilfred Laurier. Nova Scotia appears to have no other representative in the Cabinet.

New Brunswick has come off much the same. The Premier of New Brunswick, Hon. J. D. Hazen, becomes Minister of Marine and Fisheries and will of course give up Provincial politics.

British Columbia, too, contributes one member, Hon. Martin Burrell, who takes the portfolio of Minister of Agriculture. Alberta gives a Senator, Hon. Jas. Alexander Loughheed, and may be another. The Minister of Finance is given as Hon. W. T. White. The only Whites we can find are two—A Gerald White, returned as a Conservative for North Renfrew, Ontario, and a W. H. White, as a Liberal for Victoria, Alberta.

Manitoba provides two members—Dr. W. J. Roche, who becomes the Secretary of State, and who was returned as member of the Dominion Parliament; and the Hon. Robert Rogers, who becomes Minister of the Interior, and who is now a member of the Provincial Legislative body and Minister of Public Works of that province. The remainder of the seats go to Quebec and Ontario. Quebec has five seats—Hon. George E. Perley, without portfolio, and Hon. W. B. Nantel, inland

## Murder Convicted

Condemned Man Set for Order New Trial

For the first time since the Court of Criminal Appeals began its sittings, in May 1908, a person convicted of murder and sentenced to death has successfully appealed and obtained the setting aside of the conviction. The court was composed of the Lord Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Darling, and Mr. Justice Hamilton.

The successful appellant was Chas. Eliaom, a pale-faced, black-haired young man, who had been convicted of the murder of a woman named Rose Renter by stabbing her. The woman was murdered on August 29, in Wilmington Square, Clerkenwell. On behalf of the accused it was contended that his identification as the murderer was mistaken. The case was tried before Mr. Justice Avery at the Central Criminal Court.
