Bandits Walking Arsenal.

Milwaukee, Wis., May 15.—Brought to Milwaukee for safekeeping, three alleged members of a desperate gang of bandits were found to be loaded with dynamite, burglar's tools, nitroglycerine and other tools of the safe-blowers' trade.

The three arrested are James Woods, aged 42 years, of Chicago, claiming to be a salesman; Charles Mason, aged 68 years, grocer, said to be from Hamilton, Ontario, and Wm. Collier, aged 63 years, salesman, of Detroit.

They are charged with being three of the gang of four who robbed Andrew Albrecht, a West Bend saloon-keeper, two weeks ago, of \$300.

Bishop Farthing Makes Strong Speech.

"Take away the moral effect of the Church and your existence would not be safe. Weaken the Church and the evil of socialism will grow; strengthen the Church and it will stand as the moral force and for the socialism of Our Lord Jesus Christ," declared Bishop Farthing, in the course of an address given to a large gathering of laymen interested in the Diocesan Fund Campaign at the mid-day luncheon at Freeman's Hotel to-day. He strongly urged the claims of the campaign, which, he said, was conceived and is being carried on solely by laymen. His Lordship mentioned that he had that morning opened a letter enclosing a cheque for \$2,500 and promising a further cheque for \$5,000 before the year is out.

Mr. R. Wilson-Smith, the chairman, stated that despite the drawbacks of the weather and the election, he estimated that in two days' campaign speaking roughly, he could mention \$90,000 in round figures as the result.

Prince to Have Welsh Castle.

London, May 16.—There is a likelihood that the Prince of Wales will have a home of his own in his own principality. The recent death of the Dowager Lady Penrhyn makes it possible to put through the scheme which has been on foot for some time to purchase Penrhyn Castle for him.

The castle stands on an eminence, two miles from the town of Bangor in North Wales. It is a very imposing affair, with a high Norman tower and turrets.

Its interior is notable for its fine old furniture, sculptured chimney pieces, oak carvings and panelling. There is also a bedstead constructed entirely of slate, which is exquisitely toolled and finished. It took fourteen years to build the castle, and it cost \$2,500,000.

Salvation Army Is Defiant.

Quebec, May 13.—Notwithstanding the ruling of the Recorder's Court against the Salvation Army, the latter had another outdoor parade yesterday, and held a meeting on the Montcalm Market Square, which attracted a large audience. On the other hand, Adjutant McCrea, commanding officer of the Salvation Army in Quebec, has not yet paid the fine of \$10 to which Recorder Dery condemned him recently, and he formally declares that he will not pay it, whatever may happen.

CANT FIND BODY.—Though searching for it every day, there is no sign of the body of Hedley Abbott, who was drowned by the upturning of a boat in coming from Wadham Islands to Musgrave Harbor. The belief is that the body was taken out in deep water by the current and will never be recovered.

The schrs. Louise T. Churchill, Harbinger and Elsie Belle which left here Thursday last for Flat Islands had bad weather. Saturday there was a particularly strong wind and that night the Elsie Belle lost her jib-boom and received other damage, being forced to harbour at Shambler's Cove. The other crafts also got a bad drubbing.

LONDON, 22nd.
That the iceberg with which the Titanic collided was one of those about which she had warnings from other ships is the conclusion reached by the inquiry after a careful examination of wireless telegrams passed to and from steamers on day of disaster. This was brought out in the course of today's session when the testimony of Pittman, third officer; Boxhall, fourth officer; Lowe, fifth officer; concluded their evidence, similar to that given before the States Senatorial Committee.

LONDON, May 22nd.
The National Conference of the Miners' Federation, which has been meeting this week to discuss the operation recently enacted Minimum Wage Act for Miners, adjourned to-day after passing a resolution which indicates that the men are spilling for another fight. The resolution which was carried unanimously records the Federation's strenuous protest against awards being given by District Wage Boards. These boards, the members of the Federation declare, fix the minimum wage for miners at a figure below a reasonable living wage, which the Government tells the men to expect. The object of securing immediate action on this point and afterwards summon another conference without delay to deal with the Government's reply.

BERLIN, To-day.
The final session of the Reichstag was a stormy one. The Social Democratic leader, referring to the Emperor's recent threat at a banquet at Strassburg, that he would incorporate Alsace Lorraine in Prussia, declared a hope like that in England would in a parallel case either have smashed the throne or fragments or have confined the monarch making such remarks in some quiet castle, in the same way as had been done to the mad King of Bavaria and ex-Sultan Abdul Hamid. Bethmann-Hollweg, Imperial Chancellor, rose excitedly from his seat, answering and declaring the nation, which was devoted to the Emperor, would know how properly to resent such attacks.

OTTAWA, To-day.
"The attitude of Newfoundland toward Confederation with Canada is that of a man doing well in a small way who refuses the overtures of a rich neighbor, because he prefers his own independence." Such were the words of Sir Ralph Williams, Governor of Newfoundland, now here to spend some time in Montreal before he returns. "The people of Newfoundland have every respect for Canada, its wealth and resources, but just at present they prefer to remain so. Feeling may change, however. We think we are doing pretty well."

LONDON, May 22nd.
Unless a settlement of the Thames Lightermen's dispute is reached to-night a general stand-down will be ordered to-morrow, is the statement of Secretary Anderson of the London Branch of the Transport Workers' Federation. This will involve 100,000 men and bring the whole trade of the port of London to a standstill. The employers have given no sign that they are in mood to yield to the men's demands.

No progress was made toward the settlement of the London port strike, 20,000 men are now out. Sir Edward Clark, appointed to conduct the Government inquiry which opens on Friday for the Transport Workers Federation, will meet to-morrow to discuss the situation and it is expected will call a general strike.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
Advices to the State Department confirm press despatches that the negro revolutionary movement in Cuba is much more alarming and widespread than first supposed. The negroes are well armed and stealing horses, and the leaders constantly threatening foreign property. The State Department are considering the sending of a warship to the Eastern end of Cuba as additional to the small naval force now there.

Cabmen Want Tariff Settled Immediately.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—According to official notice of the Municipal Council the question of the adjustment of Cabmen's Tariff is to stand over until the return of the Premier, the Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris. Recently when the matter was before the Council it was decided that the adjustment of the grievances complained of by the Cabmen should stand over until the return of the Mayor, there might be some excuse in permitting the matter to stand over until the return of the Mayor, because the season, so to speak, had not then opened, but there cannot be any justification in allowing matters to stand until the latter end of June or July. While it may be very well for the Council to defer to the request of the Premier, still there are other people in this community to be considered, and as citizens and taxpayers we claim the right to be considered and our grievances remedied. The Cabmen have substantial grievances which are capable of adjustment in fifteen minutes, surely it is worth an effort upon the part of the Council to bring about that adjustment and not postpone the matter further. Tourist traffic will be opening with the next arrival of the Red Cross boats, and it is only fair to the public as well as cabmen that a proper tariff should be agreed upon. There may be some cabmen, as is found in every trade and occupation, who use their calling or trade for the purpose of extortion; a case may happen before the return of the Premier, then there will be a hue and cry by the press and public, and the Cabmen who always charge reasonable and fair rates will be blamed equally with him who is guilty of the extortion. There are members of the Council who agree with the principle of live and let live, that the laborer is worthy of his hire. These are the principles we want applied in connection with tariff fares. Some of the Councillors know what it is to work for a fixed rate of wages, they have always contended that in the fixing of the rate there are two parties to the bargain, he who works, and he who pays, if but one party to the bargain was considered then an injustice to the other is done. Now, this is what some members of the Council have done to the Cabmen, they have fixed a tariff to suit those who pay, and not those who work. How would the Mayor like for persons who have no knowledge of contracting to fix a price for which he shall construct buildings? How would Councillor Mullaly like for the consumer of coal to fix the price for which he shall sell coal? I have no doubt but that the two named, and very justly so, would complain very loudly of a gross injustice done, but they apparently forget the fact that the Golden Rule teach, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." Come, Mr. Mayor, you are the choice of the people in the high office of Mayor. It is your duty to protect the rights of citizens, no matter how humble their calling as citizens may be. The cabmen are citizens and taxpayers, and their rights must be respected.
What is Councillor Myrick doing in this matter? Cabmen helped to elect him, were it not for their support he would not now be sitting at the Council Board. How is he repaying the Cabmen for their support? Let him answer the question. The Cabmen do not seek favors, they only ask justice at his hands, and at the hands of some others who are throwing obstacles in the way of justice and fair play to Cabmen. We know that Councillor Myrick has been endeavouring to do his duty to the Cabmen and public, and if he had the support of others of the Council whom he should have, then the simple act of justice would be done. We feel assured that Councillor Ryan whom we regard as an honest and conscientious Councillor will see that justice is done us.
Come, gentlemen of the Council, we demand that this matter be adjusted at once and not be postponed.
With your permission, Mr. Editor, I have to ask for permission to further deal with this matter.




