W.P.A. Second Shipment.

The Women's Patriotic Association are now exhibiting at Government House, the second shipment of goods for the use of our soldiers and sailors, and also for the benefit of the wounded. The shipment includes 4,050 pairs of socks, 290 blue and gray mufflers, 130 pairs of mittens, 90 pairs of gloves, 50 Balachava helmets, 90 cholera belts, 489 khaki and grey flannel shirts, 150 night shirts, 20 red bed jackets, 110 pillows, 540 pillow slips, a large quantity of handkerchiefs, together with hospital supplies sufficient for 1,000 dressings. The hospital supplies were prepared by Mesdames (Dr.) Anderson and D. Baird; Misses Duncan and Southcott and are to be sterilized at the General Hospital before being sent abroad.

The other articles were supplied by the women throughout the island and are of the very best workmanship. The outputs have contributed largely, as goods have been received from all the larger centres, and from many of the smaller places, not represented in the first shipment. The Cardigan jackets are made after a pattern prepared by Lady Davidson and worked by the Knitting Co. and Riverside Mills, and are very comfortable garments. They will be worn inside the tunic. In the pocket of each coat is enclosed a short note. The goods upon arrival at Liverpool will be transhipped by Job Bros & Co. to the St. John Ambulance Association in London, who will attend to their distribution. Lady Louise Fielding, mother of Lady Davidson, has given up one floor of her residence at Grosvenor Gardens, as a storeroom for the goods for the Newfoundland Regiment, and is otherwise interesting herself in their behalf. The second shipment which is now ready, may be seen at the Government House from 2 this afternoon till 10 p.m.

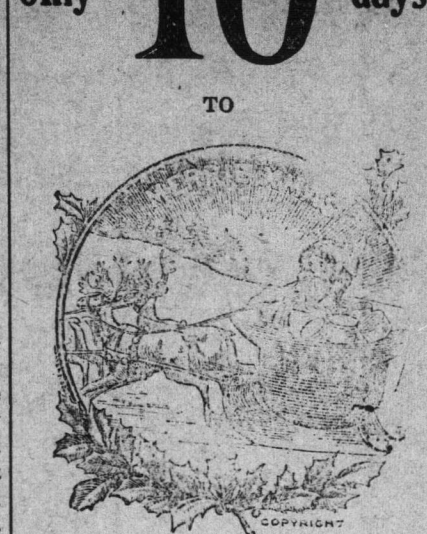
