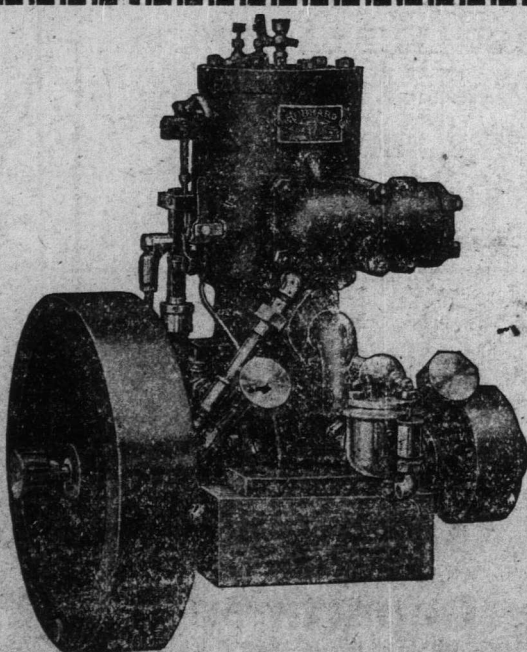

Eleven Months of Prohibition in Russia.

On September 18th, The Times published another Russian Supplement, and in it a speech by the Minister of Finance, P. L. Barck, which deals with Russian Finance and the War. He said that the war had cost in actual outlay £1,657,000 a day, and that in future they would have to reckon on an expenditure of not less than Two Million pounds sterling a day. This has in the past and is being met by loans. The ordinary expenditure has also been relieved to the extent of £52,354,000 by the transferring of the cost of feeding the Army and Navy to Loan account. The great task of the Russian Finance Minister is to meet the ordinary or non-war expenditure after adopting the heroic measure of cutting out £107,550,000 formerly paid to the Exchequer in the form of liquor revenue. It is apparently being met by the transfer of the feeding of the army and navy to loan account, and the imposing of new taxes, which on the basis of the yield of the first third of the year, it is calculated will yield £451,510,000. The most remarkable effect of Prohibition in Russia during the eleven months ending June 30th last is on the Government Savings Banks. The growth in cash and security deposits for those eleven months immediately following the war, amounted to £65,000,000 sterling. This increase is more than two and a half times greater than the total increase in deposits for the 43 months immediately preceding the war. We base this statement in figures furnished by the Russian Minister of Finance and on a table showing the operations of the Russian State Savings Banks, month by month from January, 1911, to June 30th, 1915.

PETROGRAD, To-day. A telegram from Sebastopol reports that bases for German submarines have been established at Varna and Burgas, the principal Bulgarian ports on the Black Sea. It is assumed it was from these bases that the German submarines came which are mentioned in yesterday's Russian War Office report, and which approached the Crimean coast, from which they were driven by Russian destroyers. A large number of Austrian-German aeroplanes are reported to have crossed Serbian territory in the direction of Bulgaria. Six thousand men described as Bulgarian reservists from Germany have been held up on the Roumanian frontier. The suspicion is that they are Austrian and German engineers and officers of the Roumanian Government demanded that these men be identified.

RELIEVED OF COMMAND.

PARIS, To-day. The Commander of the Anglo-French fleet in the Mediterranean has been relieved of his command at his own request, owing to serious illness.

ADVANCE AGAINST RUSSIA.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The War Office yesterday made public the following official communication: South of the Tript River, enemy detachments have occupied the village of Bereznia Volia near Poles. The enemy near Nova Selki and on the Sty near Clartorik succeeded in crossing to the right bank of the Sty. Fighting continues near Milachet South East of Kolki.

TWO STEAMERS TORPEDOED.

LONDON, To-day. The sinking of two more steamships, one of them a neutral, was announced yesterday. They are the British steamer Newcastle, 3402 tons gross, owned at Newcastle, and the Greek steamer Dimitrios, 2508 tons, owned at Andros. The crews of both vessels are reported saved.

ANTI-TREATING REGULATIONS.

LONDON, To-day. The new anti-treating regulation, in connection with the use and sale of alcoholic drinks goes into effect in London and surrounding districts today. It is the most radical and far-reaching effort for curbing the drinking yet tried, for it affects nearly one million persons. Violations of regulations are punishable by a fine of £500 and six months in prison. The authorities have given notice that these penalties would be inflicted without mercy on offenders. The law curtails the distribution of alcoholic liquors by 50 per cent. Unless it is effective, it will be followed by an order curtailing the hours of sale.

GERMAN DENIAL.

LONDON, To-day. A despatch to Reuters Telegram Company from Athens says the German Legation here categorically denies the existence of a secret treaty with Bulgaria.

PREMIER VISITS FRONT.

ROME, To-day. Great importance is attached in political circles here to the departure of Premier Salandra for the front last night for a conference. His visit is believed to be connected with the international situation.

BULGARIA'S THREE ARMIES.

LONDON, To-day. The Times Bucharest correspondent says it learns that eleven Bulgarian divisions will form three armies which will be under the command of Crown Prince Boris. The first army under General Bogatcheff will fight against Serbia and will be directed toward Uskub in order to cut the railway from Nish to Salonika; the second army under General Tencheff will fight against Greece; while the third army under General Teodoroff will watch Roumanian movements.

Dr. Geisel at Heart's Content

HEART'S CONTENT, Oct. 10.

On Saturday night, October 9th, Heart's Content was blessed by a visit from Dr. Carolyn Geisel. The S. U. F. Hall was filled to capacity by a very representative audience, several being unable to get in. The outer doors were thrown open, so that the crowd across the road might see and hear the lecture.

For one hour and a half the speaker held her audience spell bound by her teaching, her eloquence and her wonderful magnetism. Curiosity hunters as they listened to the woman doctor from the States, became interested hearers, then gatherers of deep truths. Men who had no use for prohibition became ardent prohibitionists as they grasped and assimilated scientific facts made easy of comprehension by the lucid arguments and vivid statements of fact, by the learned doctor. Women whose lives are monotonous and humdrum, gained a vision of what a woman was meant by her maker to be and to do. In children were planted seeds that will produce goodly fruit in the to-morrow day.

Above all Dr. Geisel fanned into a flame the spark of patriotism and made us realize that on us devolved the privilege of supporting the glorious Union Jack, the symbol of liberty to-day, and the responsibility of making fit standard bearers to keep the flag flying in the coming epoch.

As a result of this wonderful lecture a sense of reverence was quickened in the audience, reverence for our earthly king and pride in our empire, reverence for the King of kings and wonder for his marvellous handiwork, the body, which is a sample of the Divine.

A vote of thanks to Dr. Geisel, proposed by Rev. H. Godfrey, was carried by acclamation. The Rector of Heart's Content referred to the distinguished kindness of Harry J. Crowe, Esq., through whose generosity we enjoyed the opportunity of the evening. The Rector's remarks were heartily endorsed by the enthusiastic and appreciative audience. The proceedings ended as they began, with the hearty singing of God Save the King.

After the men had dispersed a women's auxiliary was formed to work in the interests of prohibition, to promote the study of hygiene and to carry on a health crusade. A large committee was formed, including Church of England, Catholics and Methodists.
