

VICTORY MESSAGES.

CASHIN AND MOORE WILL GET EIGHTY-FIVE PER CENT. OF VOTES IN FERRYLAND.

FERRYLAND, To-day.

Dr. Hogan and Dr. O'Reilly.

The Squires paper this morning in the endeavor to cause trouble for the Government printed a false and malicious statement regarding Dr. Hogan and Dr. O'Reilly and some public positions for which it says these medical men were applicants. We are officially informed that there is no truth in the statement that Dr. O'Reilly has been appointed to any new position in the Public Health Department. Dr. O'Reilly is attached to the Militia Department and has been merely lent to the Public Health Department for a brief period in order to carry out certain "blood tests" which are necessary for the Militia Department and the Military Hospital Commissions in regard to the treatment of returned soldiers. He puts in part of his time at the Militia Office and the remainder at the Public Health Office, and there is no warrant whatever for this statement that he has been appointed to any new position.

The statement made regarding Dr. Hogan is such as might be expected from political opponents of the Government whose sole object is to make trouble. Dr. Hogan's claims have always received due consideration and Dr. Hogan's friends in the present administration will do more for him, when the right time comes, than the people whose only reason for dragging his name before the public is not to help him in any way but to use him as an agency in the hope, which we can assure the Squires paper is a vain one, that by this means they can cause discord in the ranks of the Government party.

SINN FEIN HOLD ANNUAL MEETING.

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.
Defying the order of the Government and Commander-in-Chief in Ireland, the twelfth annual convention of Sinn Fein was held at mid-night in the Mansion House. It lasted three hours. Despite all precautions taken to prevent the meeting, complete order of business was carried through.

GREAT CAMPAIGN FOR NATIONALIZATION.

LONDON, Oct. 16.
Stuart Bunning, Secretary of the Postmen's Federation, who presided over the recent Glasgow Trades Union Congress, informed the Associated Press to-day that the Executive of the Miners' Union would soon undertake a nationwide propaganda, backed by the entire body of British labor, to acquaint the public with the reasons why the Labor Unionists were insisting upon Nationalization of the mines. The attempt will be to show that state ownership upon the basis demanded would be beneficial alike to the State, and to the consumers and to the workers.

GERMANS RESTART COLONIZATION.

BERLIN, Oct. 16.
It is announced that German emigration societies have acquired in Paraguay and the nearby region in Northern Argentine extensive land appropriate for colonization by German Emigrants. The Republic mentioned, it is stated, favored the acquisition of this land because of their desire for the speedy cultivation of vast undeveloped stretches of the country.

THE SINN FEIN CONVENTION.

DUBLIN, Oct. 16.
The Sinn Fein Convention was held at midnight Wednesday at some place at present unknown. Arthur Griffith, founder of the Sinn Fein organization, addressed five hundred delegates. He said Sinn Feiners would not flatter in their demands for a republic in Ireland and would hold no discussions with any English parties. Nearly two thousand delegates from all parts of the country came to Dublin for the meeting.

KRONSTADT HAS CAPITULATED.

STOCKHOLM, Oct. 17.
The fortress of Kronstadt has capitulated after bombardment by the British fleet which after the fort had surrendered had entered the harbor, according to advices received here. Official confirmation has been received of the capture of Krasnoyarsk, sixteen miles southwest of Petrograd by forces of General Udonitch. Heavy firing was heard off Kronstadt all day Wednesday.

REPORTED KIEV TAKEN.

LONDON, Oct. 16.
A Bolshevik wireless message from Moscow reports that Kiev was retaken yesterday by Bolshevik forces, according to advices received here.

A TRAGIC TALE OF THE SEA.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 17.
A tragic tale of the seas was unfolded here to-day by four survivors of British schooner Onato picked up while drifting helplessly several hundred miles from shore by American steamship Zirkel. Survivors all from Newfoundland say Captain of Onato, James Brumia and his brother, Ernest, first mate were crushed to death by shifting of the ship's cargo. Stories, however, do not agree with that told by Capt. Sullivan, master of Zirkel, which arrived here to-day and all four men were locked up at Gloucester immigration, on charges of mutiny. They will be turned over to British Consul. Capt. Sullivan declared that when he drew near the schooner he plainly could see what appeared to be general mutiny.

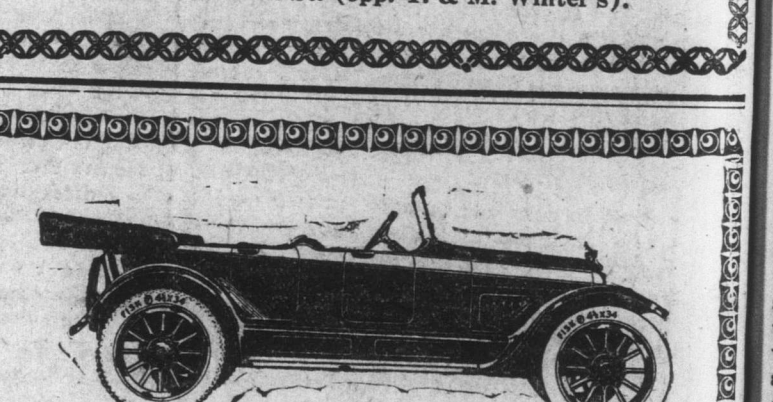
