

Rt. REV. H. T. RENOUF

Consecrated Bishop of St. George's.

His Grace Archbishop Roche, Bishop March of Harbor Grace and Bishop Morrison of Antigonish Perform Ceremony--Solemnly Magnificent and Impressive Ritual.

At the R. C. Cathedral of St. John the Baptist this morning, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, a large number of people assembled to witness the imposing ceremony of consecration. Amongst the distinguished gathering present were His Excellency the Governor and suite, the Premier, Hon. Mr. Coaker and other members of the Executive, members of the Legislative Council, Guards of honor from the Holy Name Society, P.C.C. and Boy Scouts were also present. The ceremony began with a procession through the Ambulatory, the cross with acolytes leading, followed by the clergy, amongst whom were Rt. Rev. Monsignor McDermott, V.G., Rt. Rev. Mons. McCarthy, Rt. Rev. Mons. Donnelly, Very Rev. Dean Tierney, Rev. Fr. Nolan, Rev. Fr. Fyne, Rev. Fr. McCarthy, Rev. (Dr.) Carter, Rev. Fr. Sheehan, Rev. Fr. Wilson, Rev. Fr. Nolan (Fortune Hill), Rev. Fr. Flynn, Rev. Fr. Pippy, Rev. Dr. Kitchin, Rev. Fr. Dee, Rev. Fr. O'Callahan.

Bishop-elect was bound with a linen cloth. The Veni Creator Spiritus being intoned, the head of the Bishop-elect was anointed with Holy Chrism, an Anthem and Psalm being sung during the anointing of the hands.

CONFERRING THE CROZIER.

In conferring the Crozier, the Consecrator bound the hands of the newly-consecrated with a linen cloth, and presented to him his Pastoral Staff, the emblem of his charge as the Shepherd of his flock, saying: "Take this Staff of the Pastoral office, that in correcting vice thou mayest be mercifully severe, maintaining judgment without anger, that while encouraging virtue, thou mayest gently soothe the souls of thy hearers, nor neglect, in thy calmness, the due severity of justice. R. Amen."

CONFERRING THE RING.

The ring, the symbol of the new Bishop's espousals to his Church, was then placed on the fourth finger of the right hand, the Consecrator, saying: "Take this Ring, the signet of faith, that adorned with faith undefiled, thou mayest without blame guard the Bride of God, which is His Holy Church, R. Amen."

Then taking the Book of the Gospels from his shoulders, he delivered it closed to him, saying: "Take the Gospel, and go, and preach to the people entrusted to thee; for God is able to increase His Grace in thee. Who liveth and reigneth unto the ages of ages. R. Amen."

The Consecrating Bishop, and after him the Assistant Bishops, now gave him the Kiss of Peace, saying: "Peace be to thee."

Bishop—Aid, with thy spirit."

Then the newly-consecrated Bishop, accompanied by his assistants and attendants, withdrew to his altar, where the Gospel, intoned 1-57-68 was read. The Gospel being read Bishop Morrison entered the pulpit and preached a splendid sermon on the ceremony, emphasizing the necessity of both law and order in the ceremonial of the Church.

At the conclusion the celebrant continued the Mass, intoning the Credo. During the offertory the newly-consecrated Bishop presented his offerings, two lighted torches, which refer to those words of Christ in Luke XII: 35: "Let your loins be girt and burning lamps in your hands." Two loaves of bread and two barrels of wine, which are symbols of the sacrifice of the New Law, and of which the Bishop is a High Priest; for the Episcopate is the perfection of the Priesthood. The celebrant having received the offerings, turned to the Altar, and the newly consecrated Bishop standing with his assistants at the corner of the altar, said with him the rest of the Mass word for word.

The new Bishop was then solemnly enthroned, the Consecrator leading him by the right hand, and the senior assistant by the left. His Pastoral Staff was handed to him, and returning to the Altar steps, the Consecrator intoned and the Choir took up and sang the Te Deum.

The newly consecrated Bishop meanwhile proceeded round the church where he blessed the faithful.

SOLEMN BENEDICTION.

Returning to the altar, the celebrant and the assistant Bishops retired to the Gospel side, where solemn Benediction was given from the highest steps by the new Bishop, who afterwards saluted the celebrant on his knees 3 times, saying: "Unto many years." He then retired to his throne.

The first Chapter of the Gospel according to St. John, concluded, the impressive ceremony.
