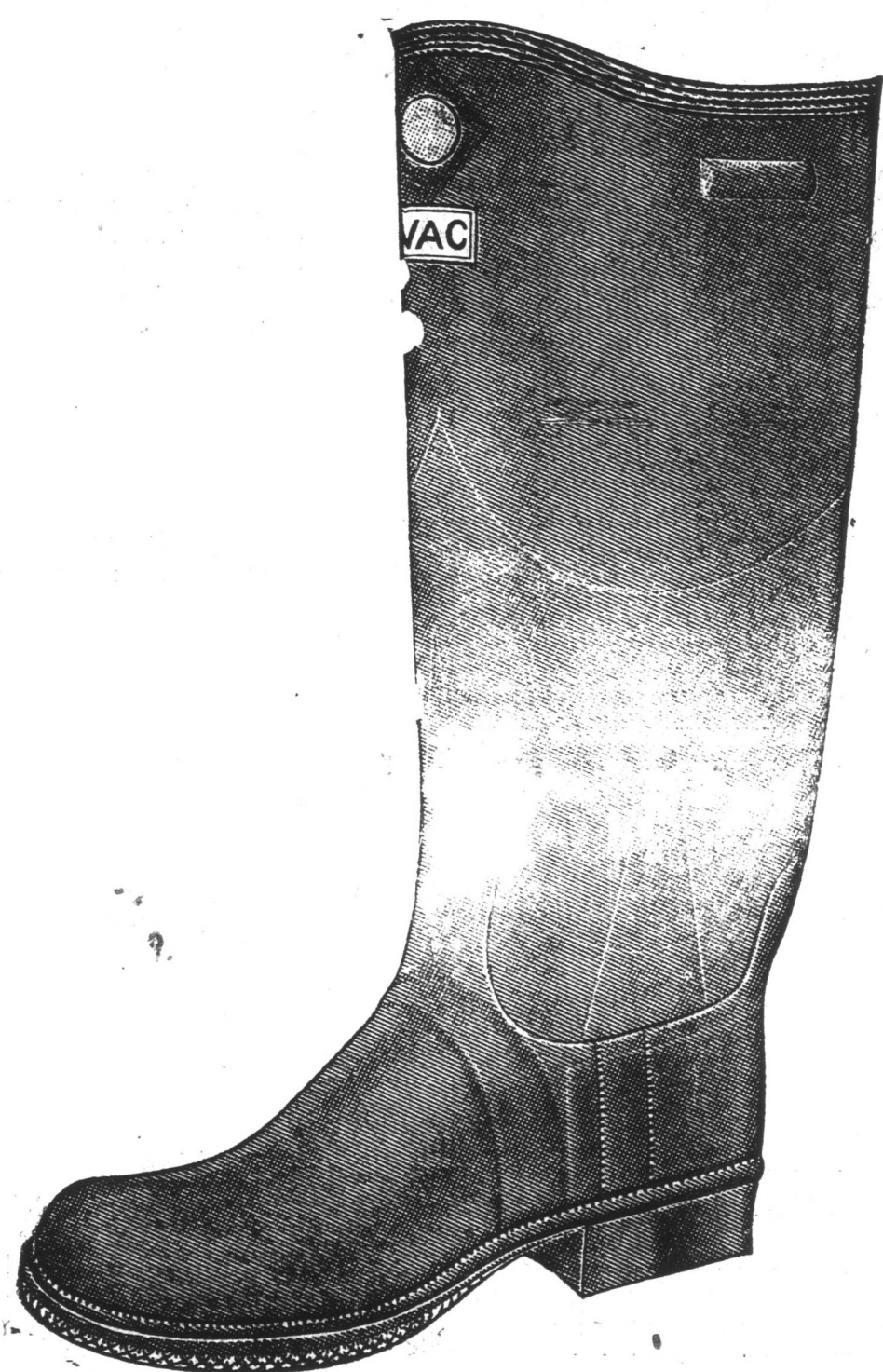

A Careless Military Commander.

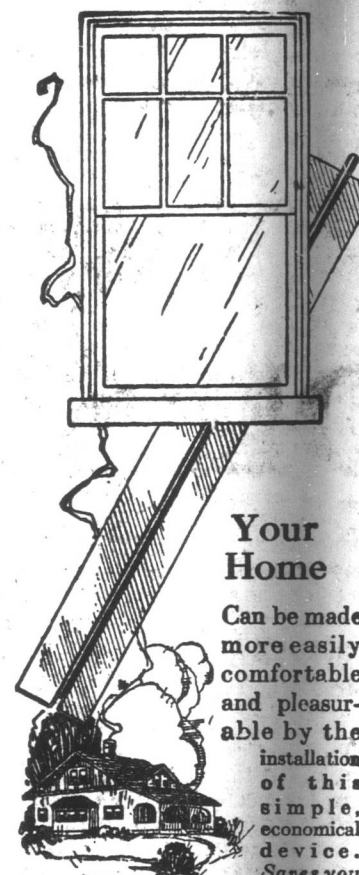
In 1895, General Arimondi, commander in chief of the 11 advanced posts in Abyssinia, sent from the fortified town of Markalla a flying column of two thousand, five hundred native troops under Italian officers, with a mounted battery, the whole under the command of Major Toellli. On Sunday, December 8, the Major reached a place called Amba Alagi. He had no idea that there was any hostile force in the neighborhood, and he bivouacked without sending out any scouts to search the hills, and only posted a few sentinels near the camp; in fact, he arranged his bivouac just as if he were at home in Italy in peace time, and he paid dearly for his carelessness. There were some twenty thousand of Menelik's troops—rifemen and spearmen—moving on Amba Alagi, and that same Sunday night they fell upon Toellli's little force. The Italian officers and their native troops made a hard fight, but the battery was rushed and captured, three fourths of the officers were shot or speared, two thousand, two hundred of their men fell in the fight, and a mere handful—less than three hundred—escaped from that field of slaughter and reached the fort of Makalla.

Dry Throats Reduce Wine Production.

ROME.—Prohibition laws in America continue to have their effect on the production of wine in Europe, especially in Italy and Spain, the most important wine growing countries on the Continent. According to the International Institute of Agriculture, the 1922 vintage in Italy is estimated at 726,000,000 gallons, or about 18 per cent. below the average of the previous five years. In Spain the yield of wine is expected this year to be 475,000,000 gallons, or eight per cent. below the last five years.
