NEW PUMPER DEMONSTRATES

public exhibition of the chemical and hose car pumping machine was given at Clift's Cove. It was witnessed by his Excellency the Governor, Ledy Allardyce, Miss Allardyce, his Worship the Mayor, Hon, Tasker Cook, Councillors and Board of Fire Underwriters. The machine was run down on Baird's wharf, and the water was drawn from the Harbor. The first exhibition (deluge) three streams were turned into what is known as the siamese connection. This sent the water from the three hoses out thru' one nozzle. In the second exhibition three separate streams were operated. A further exhibition of four separate streams by means of a "Y" attachment followed. The whole demonstrated the utility of this new and modern addition to our fire fighting apparatus. The water in each case was drawn from the Harbor and within two seconds after the pumping began the streams were available. A deluge of water at the rate of 800 gal lons a minute was played on the Court House Building. His Excellency the Governor and the large concourse of citizens who witnessed the demonstration congratulated Inspectr General Hutchings on his initiative in having this machine added to the Fire Department. Mr. Eller Starr, the expert, who arrived by the Rosalind with the machine, operated the pumps, during yesterday's demonstration. The pumps will afford special protection to property on the Higher Levels, and also in the suburbs. Yesterday morning a demonstration was made from the hydrant on Harvey Road. The pressure at the hydrant was 12 1-2 lbs., while the pressure at the nozzle of the pumper when in operation showed 80 pounds. With two streams connected the water was sent up to the top of the tower of the R.C. Cathedral.
