BAKER GOES ONE BETTER.

Easy Win for Last Year's Second in Walk to Brighton.

W. F. Baker (Queen's Park H.), who finished second in 3h. 41m. 35s. in the same event last year, won the Surrey Walking Club's open London to Brighton race (approximately fifty-two miles) in 3h. 40m. 51s. on Saturday.

One hundred and eight men left "Big Ben" at Westminster in the early morning, and at Croydon Baker held fourth place. At Purley Corner he had crept up into second position, and was then only 5s. behind the leader, J. K. Chalk.

At Redhill—twenty miles out of London—he had the lead, which he never relinquished afterwards. He won by nearly three miles from A. Hubbard (Surrey W.C.), who was second.

Those who qualified for silver standard medals were: W. F. Baker, A. Hubbard, E. A. Wall, J. B. Belchamber, H. St. G. Taylor, S. A. Manning, G. W. Gosling, F. R. Scott and J. K. Chalk. Belgrave Harriers won the team prize.

SOUTH AFRICANS WIN RUGBY.

Rugby Touring Side Put Up Strumous Fight, But Only Draw.

The third Test match between South Africa and the British team of Rugby tourists ended in a drawn of 3 points each at Port Elizabeth on Saturday.

Eighteen minutes from the start Kinnear smartly got away and when tackled near the line gave to Cunningham, who put the Britons 3 points in front with an unconverted try. Seven minutes later Van Druen got over for South Africa, but Voyce charged down the kick at goal.

During the first half play was almost entirely limited to the forwards, but after the breather the British outsidies were seen to advantage, though they were never able to pierce a dour defence.

As the Africans had won the two previous Tests and have drawn this one they have won the rubber.

BETTY NUTHALL'S DOUBLE.

Girl Lawn Tennis Wonder Wins Two Championships at Wimbledon.

After losing the first set to Miss E. M. Dearman, Miss Betty Nuthall, the thirteen-year-old lawn tennis wonder, won the girls' singles junior championship of Great Britain at Wimbledon on Sept. 13 with a score of 4-6, 6-4, 6-1.

Miss Nuthall recorded her second championship success by winning the girls' doubles with Miss S. Hartley. J. S. Olliv (St. Paul's), the Surrey junior champion, won the boys' singles with a victory over T. V. N. Anderson (Marlborough) by 6-1, 6-3, 6-3. R. D. N. Pryce-Jones and M. V. Callender were successful in the doubles.

Father and Son in the Arsenal XI's On the Same Day.

The Arsenal Football Club recently signed on as an amateur John James Rutherford, the 18-year-old son of their international outside-right Jock Rutherford.
