

THE CROWN PRINCE AND PRINCESS.—Anecdotes connected with the visit of the Crown Prince and the Princess Victoria in the German department of the Exhibition at Vienna, are still current. A letter inserted in a Swiss paper narrated a little incident which happened—Prince Frederick William, being about to enter the French department of the Exhibition, was for a moment stopped by his cicerone, who said to him, "Your Imperial Highness will perhaps please to wait a little till the French workmen have withdrawn?" But the Prince answered, "Oh, let us go on." He went through the department. The French workmen stared a little glumly at him, evidently dissatisfied; but the official French Commissioner received him quite agreeably. Generally the Prince is popular at Vienna, and often mingles with the townspeople who meet him in his walks through the Exhibition.
