LEATHER WORKERS HAVE GOT PART WAY

Conference Between Employer and Employees is Progressing Very Satisfactorily.

The leatherworkers employed by the Great West Saddlery Co. have not yet reached a complete agreement with the company, but it is expected that a satisfactory arrangement will be reached within the next few days. The company has agreed to give the men a 9-hour day in place of a 10-hour one, with the same wages per day as formerly, and the men have been working only nine hours for the last two weeks.

The demand for an increase of 10 per cent. on piece work, however, has not been finally adjusted. An agreement is being gradually worked out. The company contends that the piece-work men have been getting more than they are entitled to because since the present schedule was introduced a large amount of up-to-date machinery has been installed, enabling the work to be turned out more quickly. The company contends that it is willing to give the men between ten and fifteen per cent more than it pays its men in Winnipeg for piece work. The employees say that the higher cost of living here should be taken into consideration, but the company argues that living expenses are not more than five per cent greater than in Winnipeg.

SIR JOHN FRENCH WILL BE AT THE CAMP

Distinguished Soldier Will Arrive in the City From Ottawa to Inspect Encampment on June 15.

Lieut. Gen. Sir John French, Inspector-General of the British Imperial Army, and Inspector General Sir Percy Lake of the Canadian militia, will arrive here from Ottawa, June 23, to inspect the annual district encampment beginning in Calgary June 15. Col. C. H. Cruickshank of Military District No. 13, who will be the commandant of the encampment, has been so notified. The two officers are making a trip of inspection through the whole of Canada, and will leave again June 25.

Lieut. Gen. French is a distinguished cavalry officer. He was Inspector of cavalry service before being advanced to his present rank, and was commander of the cavalry division under Lord Roberts at the relief of Kimberley and the capture of Cronje's army at Paardeberg. The encampment will last twelve days. It will be held on the industrial school grounds. One of the features of the camp will be the organization of the troops in the district. It is reported that Col. Walker will be advanced to the rank of brigadier to take command, but no official announcement has been made yet. The troops comprising the brigade will be the Fifth Cavalry, Fifteenth Light Horse, Fifteenth Mounted Rifles of Edmonton, Twenty-first Alberta Hussars of Medicine Hat, and the Twenty-third Alberta Rangers of Macleod.

CALGARY PEOPLE ARE FORGETTING RULES

Perpetual Streams Are Running on Some of the City Lawns, Contrary to Regulations.

Citizens are wasting so much water in sprinkling their lawns that there is danger of the pressure in the mains being so greatly reduced as to leave the city in a serious situation in case of fire. Steam is being kept up continually at the pumping station to be ready for such an emergency, but unless consumers are more careful to conform to the bylaw, it may be necessary to employ a number of inspectors temporarily to see that the bylaw is observed.

At times the pressure has already been so greatly reduced that people living on the hills have complained. Unable to get water out of the faucets upstairs, they have been obliged to use the basement taps. People not only sprinkle during prohibited hours according to Mr. Graves, but they sprinkle without nozzles on their lawns, which is also against the rules. Some persons allow the water to run on their lawns all night, and in the morning the walks and streets in front of their premises are sometimes streaming with water.

The enormous quantity of 237,000 gallons is being used daily for street sprinkling alone, and this, together with the large quantity used by factories and domestic consumers is a severe tax on the gravity supply. However, the supply is adequate and will be for several years to come if it is not wasted.

LETHBRIDGE MAN HAS AN INTERESTING TRIP

Percy Ashe Sails From Vancouver to San Diego in a Small Yawl Rigged Yacht.

G. P. Ashe, the well known horseman, of Milk River, and property owner of Lethbridge, returned yesterday morning, with Mrs. Ashe, from the coast, where they have been spending the winter.

Mr. and Mrs. Ashe spent most of the time in Southern California, which they reached in their 47-ton auxiliary yacht the Olympic.

Mr. Ashe accomplished a feat declared by Pacific coast yachtsmen to be unique, namely to make the trip in a small yawl rigged yacht from Vancouver to San Diego, and back, in the winter months.

As reported previously briefly in the Herald, they met with many adventures.

The Olympic is a yawl rigged boat, with auxiliary gasoline engines, which were never used during the whole trip. She is 65 feet in length, with 18 feet beam and 8 feet draught. In this boat, Mr. and Mrs. Ashe, a friend, W. W. Glenville, and four sailors, set sail in December. When but a hundred miles south west of Cape Platery, they encountered a terrific hurricane, the worst storm, coast sailors declared, to be experienced in 17 years. For six days and six nights they lay to in the storm under storm

They made the trip from San Francisco to Santa Catalina Island, a distance of 500 miles in fifty-two hours. There they were treated like princes, as they were also at San Diego. The company that owns Santa Catalina Island were the whitest people they came across, giving them their own private mooring and leaning their launches for all purposes.

Summing up the trip, Mr. Ashe says it takes a cowboy from the prairies to steer across the open seas, and Mrs. Ashe was the "best man of the crew."

Not the least exciting part of their trip was caused by two whales discovered they could scratch their backs upon the ship's bottom and caused considerable trepidation.

They arrived back in Vancouver on April 28th, and the yacht has been dismantled for the summer months.

The Olympic was the first yacht that ever tried the trip during the winter months.

Mr. and Mrs. Ashe left this morning for their home ranch on the Milk River, where they will spend the summer.

HEROIC WOMAN WHO SAVED LIFE OF PRINCE

Emperor of Austria Sends Gold Chain To One of His Subjects

Vienna, May 7.—In spite of his age, Emperor Francis has a retentive memory. He has just sent a double chain of gold, with his initials in diamonds, to a certain Frau Catherine Winkler on her eightieth birthday, in memory of the fact that she saved the life of the Prince Imperial, the ill-fated Rudolph, in 1871.

On Sunday, the proprietor of a restaurant for tourists in the valley of the Naif, in the Tyrol, was in her home with her little 2-year-old son when she heard cries of distress from the river Naif, a swift flowing tributary of the Danube. She ran in the direction of the cries.

On the opposite bank of the river she saw a man and a 10-year-old boy clinging to the little shrubs that grew between the stones, pressing his face against the rocks to avoid becoming giddy at the sight of the torrent far below. She called out to them to hold on tight, and at peril of her life climbed along the slippery lower wall and finally reached the man, whom she caught in her arms and helped to descend to the bank of the river. Then she did the same for the child.

It was later that she learned the identity of those she had rescued. The prince imperial gave her all the money he had and made her promise to say nothing of his terrible adventure lest his parents should learn of it. She kept the secret and the prince was not told until 1880, when the officers of the garrison of Moran erected a marble tablet on the spot where the prince had been in danger.
