Suicide of Mrs. Seavey.

A Chicago telegram of Sunday's date
says: "People strolling through Jefferson
Park about 1 o'clock this afternoon noticed
a handsome-looking woman, dressed in
black, hurrying along one of the walks.

When she reached the center of the park
she drew a revolver and shot herself in the
left breast, causing instant death. The
suicide was identified as Mrs. Julia Seavey,
a respectable English widow, residing on
West Adams street. At her house was
found a letter to her son, John Seavey,
who resides in London, Ont., and who is
said to be a successful business man. Mrs.
Seavey owned property valued at about
\$20,000. Her mind is supposed to have
been affected by ill health and family
troubles." The cause of Mrs. Seavey's
death was probably as stated in this
dispatch. She was twice married, but had
no children by her second husband, who
proved far from a model man. For some
time past she had declined to live with him.
She was very much attached to her son,
who is a fine young fellow.

Huron Church Workers' Convention.

The active co-operation of the lady of
both sexes in the work of the church has
received a powerful impetus during the past
few years in the Diocese of Huron. The at-
tention given by the Synod to Sunday school
matters, of which a large and energetic
committee has special charge; the organiza-
tion of a lay workers' association, and
last, but not least, the zealous ef-
forts of a women's missionary aux-
iliary, have all borne good fruit.

A diocesan church workers' and Sunday
school convention, to be held at St.
Thomas on Oct. 28 and 29, under the
presidency of the bishop of the diocese, is
an outcome of these movements. The
annual meeting of the Lay Workers'
Association takes place at the same time.
The two Anglican congregations in St.
Thomas are making preparations to give
the visitors a hospitable reception, and the
railways are offering liberal rates. An ex-
cellent programme is in course of prepara-
tion. Among other speakers or contribu-
tors of papers will be Mr. C. R. W. Biggar,
of Toronto, who will especially present the
Sunday school question, while Rev. Robert
Ker, of St. Catharines, will criticize our
existing Sunday schools with his wonted
ability. Mr. Charles Jenkins, of Petrolia,
one of the ablest Anglican clergymen in
Canada, gives an address on lay help,
Rural Dean Mackenzie, of Brantford, will
read a paper on its practical aspects.

A delegation from the council of St.
Andrew's Brotherhood will attend and
deal particularly with the duty of
young men to the church. It is
hoped, too, that a lady representative of
the mission cause and another lady engaged
in Sunday school teaching will favor the
convention with papers. The Rev. N. V.
Martin, of Christ Church, Chatham, whose
Sunday school is the largest in the diocese,
and Mr. Jasper Golden, one of the oldest
and most faithful of Sunday school teachers
and lay readers, will discuss Sunday school
work and Bible class teaching respectively.

An interesting, and it is hoped, highly
profitable feature in the arrangements will
be a special service to be held in Trinity
Church, St. Thomas, on the evening of Oct.
28, when the bishop of Huron will deliver
an address on church work. The pro-
gramme, when issued, will contain the
names of other church workers
who will take part in the proceedings. The
bishop has issued a pastoral circular to the
clergy, requesting their co-operation.
