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WORKINGMEN'S LEGISLATIVE CLUBS.

An Educational Platform Drafted—A Change in Name—The Industrial Banner.

The first regular union meeting for the season of the Workingmen's Legislative Clubs met at 8 p.m. in Labor Hall last (Monday) evening. The chair was taken by the president at 8:05 p.m. On roll call, wards 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 were represented. The minutes of meeting Oct. 3 were read and confirmed. Several new members were accepted, who subscribed to platform and bylaws.

After the transaction of other business, the secretary placed on the table a notice of motion: "That this organization drop the name Workingmen's Legislative Club, and be in future called the ward clubs of the 'London Federation of Labor.'"

On motion it was carried unanimously that the secretary write to the City Council requesting: 1. That a copy of the printed minutes of the proceedings of the City Council be regularly supplied to the secretary of this organization for the benefit and instruction of its members. 2. That the question of publishing in convenient form the assessment rolls of the city of London be submitted to a plebiscite of the electors at the coming municipal elections. On motion the executive committee was instructed to draft an educational platform to cover the winter season, to include debates on matters relating to platform planks such as the referendum, the 8-hour day, woman suffrage, municipal ownership, etc.

A report was handed in from the committee managing the Industrial Banner, stating that it was proposed to form a joint stock company to run the same, capital to be \$1,000 in shares of \$5, payable on call at \$1 monthly, the paper to be enlarged and some 5,000 copies to be distributed free as the official organ of the labor party of London.

The secretary was instructed to advertise the alternate Monday meetings of the club in the preceding Saturday issue of the city press. It was resolved after an animated discussion that "Whereas, the Workingmen's Legislative Clubs were organized by authority of and in affiliation with the Trades and Labor Council, the secretary be instructed to request that the executive committee of three from each ward club sit as delegates with the Trades and Labor Council in future."

After transaction of financial and other business, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m. in due order to Monday, Nov. 12.

DEATH-DEALING BLOWS.

Two Men Killed as the Result of Drunken Brawl.

BUFFALO, Oct. 29.—Adam Eberle was instantly killed today by a blow with the fist struck by John Liske. The men quarreled in a saloon and then fought. Liske, who is a plasterer, struck Eberle, a barber, a vicious blow over the heart, with the result noted.

A SECOND CASE.

HARRISON, Mich., Oct. 29.—James Doyle killed Charles Buck in a drunken brawl. A blow from the fist did the deadly work. The two men attended a dance in a Greenwood lumber camp Saturday night. Doyle and Buck became involved in a fight, which seems to have been prompted by jealousy and liquor combined. They grappled, struggled, then Doyle "batted away" with his clenched fist and dealt a stunning blow on Buck's neck. Buck tottered, gasped, and fell to the ground dead. The blow had broken his neck.

IN LABOR'S REALM.

End of the Big Strike in Fall River, Mass.—Weavers Going to Work.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Oct. 29.—The big strike of weavers was declared off today and the strikers will return to work tomorrow. They were defeated by the manufacturers and they will resume their old places under a reduced scale of wages.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 29.—Ottawa K. of L. district lodge has been disintegrated, from representation at the General Assembly of the K. of L., which meets at New Orleans on Nov. 11, because it has not 100 members.

FOUGHT WITH A WOMAN.

Miss Jones Fatally Wounds a Man Who Had Jumped Her Claim.

PERRY, O. T., Oct. 29.—A duel was fought between Miss Agnes Jones, about 21 years old, and Sam Bartell, 35 years old, on a homestead north of here yesterday. Miss Jones obtained the homestead when the Cherokee Strip was opened in September, 1893, and had built a neat home. Two months ago she went to visit her parents in Kansas, and Sam Bartell jumped the claim and moved his effects into Miss Jones' house.

Miss Jones returned yesterday and found her home occupied. She gave orders for it to be vacated at once. Bartell refused to go, and she pulled a revolver from under her apron and opened fire. Bartell returned the fire, but missed the woman. Three of her shots took effect in Bartell's body, and he will die.

Two Children Burned to Death.

CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Oct. 29.—On Saturday night two children of Joseph Peters, Runio, were fatally burned by a lamp upsetting, living only 24 hours.

The Premier Starts for England.

OTTAWA, Oct. 29.—Sir John Thompson left today for New York and will sail on Wednesday by the steamer Majestic for England. The Premier's second daughter accompanies him. He goes to be sworn in a member of the Imperial Privy Council. His daughter will stop in Paris to pursue her studies.

Halifax Firemen Fired.

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 29.—The city council tonight voted 10 to 7 to summarily dismiss the firemen of Halifax. It was on account of the refusal of the Union Engine Company to obey an order of the council. New firemen have been provided to man the apparatus in case of emergency tonight and until permanent arrangements be made.

London City Election, Nov. 20.

The Duty of Every One—Personal Registration Must Be Attended to at Once.

In each of the six wards of the city, a place for registration has been provided. There each manhood suffrage voter, each new comer and every man 21 years of age who finds his name omitted from the lists now existing, must personally attend on either of the four following days of this week—Wednesday, Thursday, Friday or Saturday—to have his name placed on THE NEW VOTERS' LIST, or he will not be able to vote at the election on Nov. 20 next.

Let no man 21 years of age or upwards take it for granted that he has a vote unless he discovers from the chairman of his sub-division or at the central committee rooms of the Liberal Association, Oddfellows' block, that his name is on the list.

It has been found that names of well-known citizens in various parts of the city, have been dropped from the lists prepared at the City Hall, since last election. See to it also that the name of your neighbor, who is in favor of the election of Mr. Hobbs, is also on the list.

The Liberal rooms in Oddfellows' Hall are open day and night, and there any elector can easily find out if his name will be on the list without attending personally to register.

The only qualification necessary is residence in the Province for one year before 31st October, 1894, and three months' residence in the city before 31st October, 1894, and residence in the city on that day.

The hours for registration on above days will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m., and from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m.

Workingmen are supposed to have preference between 7 and 8 p.m.

Electors, don't fail to have your names put on AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE.

Young men who are neither owners nor tenants, and newcomers to the city, WILL NOT BE ON THE LIST UNLESS THEY PERSONALLY REGISTER.

Every citizen registers in the ward where he lives. The following are the places:

No. 1 ward—A room in the City Hall. C. G. Jarvis, registrar.

No. 2 ward—Mrs. E. Mercer's house, 619 Richmond street. R. M. C. Toth, registrar.

No. 3 ward—Thos. Atkinson's house, southwest corner of Simcoe and Burwell streets. J. D. O'Neill, registrar.

No. 4 ward—Labor Hall, Dufferin avenue, near Maitland. H. Irwin, registrar.

No. 5 ward—East End Hall. W. A. Proudfoot, registrar.

No. 6 ward—W. R. Brown's vacant store, 142 Wortley road. B. C. McCann, registrar.
