

WORKINGMEN'S LEGISLATIVE CLUBS

An Educational Platform Drafted-A Change in Name-The Indus-

trial Banner. The first regular union meeting for the season of the Workingmen's Legislative Clubs met at 8 p.m. in Labor Hall last (Monday) evening. The chair was taken by the president at 8:05 p.m. On roll call, wards 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 were represented. The minutes of meeting Oct. 3 were read and confirmed. Several new members were accepted, who subscribed to platform and

After the transaction of other business, the secretary placed on the table a notice "That this organization drop of motion: the name Workingmen's Legislative Club, and be in future called the ward clubs of the "London Federation of Labor."

On motion it was carried unanimously that the secretary write to the City Council requesting: 1. That a copy of the printed minutes of the proceedings of the City Council be regularly supplied to the secretary of this organization for the benefit and instruction of its members. 2. That the question of publishing in convenient form the assessment rolls of the city of London be submitted a plebiscite of the electors at the coming municipal elections.

On motion the exceutive committee was instructed to draft an educational platform to cover the winter season, to include debates an matters relating to platform planks such as the referendum, the 8-hour day, woman suffrage, municipal ownership,

A report was handed in from the committee managing the Industrial Banner, stating that it was proposed to form a joint stock company to run the same, capital to be \$1,000 in shares of \$5, payable on call at \$1 monthly, the paper to be enlarged and some 5,000 copies to be distributed free as the official organ of the labor party of London.

The secretary was instructed to advertise the alternate Monday meetings of the clubs in the preceding Saturday issue of the city press. It was resolved after an animated discussion that "Whereas, the Workingmen's Legislative Clubs were organized by authority of and in affiliation with the Trades and Labor Council, the secretary be instructed to request that the executive committee of three from each ward club sit as delegates with the Trades and Labor Council in future.' After transaction of financial and other

business, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m. in due order to Monday, Nov. 12.

London City Election, Nev. 20.

The Duty of Every One-Personal Registration Must Be Attended to at Once.

In each of the six wards of the city, place for registration has been provided. There each manhood suffrage voter, each newcomer and every man 21 years of age who finds his name omitted from the lists now existing, must personally attend on either of the four following days of this week-Wednesday, Thursday, Friday or Saturday-to have his name placed on

THE NEW VOTERS' LIST, or he will not be able to vote at the election on Nov. 20 next.

Let no man 21 years of age or upwards take it for granted that he has a vote unless he discovers from the chairman of his sub-division or at the central committee rooms of the Liberal Association, Oddfellows' block, that his name is on the list. It has been found that names of well-known citizens ln various parts of the city, have been dropped from the lists prepared at the City Hall, since last election. See to it also that the name of your neighbor, who is in favor of the election of Mr. Hobbs, is also on the list.

The Liberal rooms in Oddfellows' Hall are open day and night, and there sny elector can easily find out if his name will be on the list without attending personally

The only qualification necessary is residence in the Province for one year before 31st October, 1894, and three months' residence in the city before 31st October, 1894, and residence in the city on that day.

The hours for registration on above days will be from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., from 2 p.m.

to 6 p.m., and from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Workingmen are supposed to have preference between 7 and 8 p.m.

Electors, don't fail to have your names put on AS EARLY AS POSSIBLE.

Young men who are neither owners nor tenants, and newcomers to the city, WILL NOT BE ON THE LIST UNLESS THEY PERSONALLY REGISTER.
