NOT BORN TO BE HANGED

Sutton Sentenced to Death Six Time

but Finally Pardoned. Richmond, .Va., Aug. 27 .- Gov. O'Ferrall yesterday pardoned Wayman Sutton, of Wytheville, charged with killing Peter Harvel. Sutton shot Harvel from ambush in 1892. Sutton was tried, convicted, and sentenced to be hanged. His friends formed a mob and rescued him from prison. Sutton then went out to the State of Washington and became a Sunday school teacher and a member of a military company. He was brought back to Richmond and resentenced.

It was found that he was sentenced

on Sunday, and the prisoner had to be tried and sentenced for the third time. This time the judge failed to give the condemned man 30 days from the time of trial to the time of execution, according to law and Sutton had to be resentenced.

A technicality in two cases necessitated the man being sentenced twice more, and then Gov. McKinney commuted the death sentence to life imprisonment. The testimony of the chief witnesses against the prisoner in a subsequent trial was impeached, and upon this ground Gov. O'Ferrall pardoned Sutton. He has served two years in the penitentiary. He left last night to join his wife and family in Tennessee.
