The Bank of England has advanced its rate from 2 1-2 to 3 per cent. The suit of Miss Annie McSpirrit for \$1,488 against Rev. J. J. McCann, Rev. In the death of Mrs. Charlotte E. Hatt, which occurred at Montreal on Monday, the last of the family of Col. De Salberry, the hero of Chateauguay, disappears. Mrs. Hatt was the youngest daughter of the great French-Canadian soldier and patriot, and was 80 years of age at the time of her death. She was the widow of the late Augustas Hatt, of Chambly.

The great flood was preceded by severe earthquakes. Then followed a downpour such as has never been experienced on the islands. European residents were panic-stricken, and sought shelter on the high lands. The Minatogawa overflowed its banks at midnight on the 26th inst., and the waters inundated the streets and fields and swept away 300 houses and drowned 200 people at Kobe. After twelve hours' work the broken embankments were repaired by sand bags. To make the fate of Kobe worse, a fire broke out late in the evening, and, fanned by the high wind, spread over the entire city. One thousand nine hundred blocks, including 2,260 houses and twelve go-downs, were destroyed totally, and ten houses, two police boxes, one fire brigade station, four tem-

#### The Dervishes Pursued by the Victorious British-Egyptians.

Splendid Management of the Try ing Campaign.

British Capture Guns, Ammunition, Grain and Flocks.

The Rule of the Khalifa Breken-Plans for the Future.

Dongola, on the Nile, Sept. 23 .- The Egyptian flag was hoisted over Dongola today. The Dervishes are in full flight, and are being pursued by the gunboats on the river and by the cavalry on the west bank of the Nile. The advance was ordered at an early hour this morning, and the Anglo-Egyptian forces were close upon the Dervishes before the latter were called to arms. But the Dervishes were quickly thrown into a state of demoralization, and fled gunboats, cavalry and camel corps. Emirs of importance surrendered, and a number of the Dervish troops announced their willingness to serve under the Egyptian flag, which was soon afterwards formally hoisted over Dongola, which is now occupied by the Anglo-Egyptian force. campaign proper is thus brought to a speedy and eminently successful conclusion. The plans of Sir Herbert Kitchener have been carried out to the letter with machine-like smoothness. reflecting considerable credit upon all concerned, for the greatest of difficulties, cholera, terrible heat, fearful storms and the transportation of supplies and ammunition, for an army of over 15,000 men, over the most difficult country imaginable, have been steadily overcome, and the goal which was the object of the expedition has been

Much more, however, remains to be done in order to complete the reconquest of the Soudan, reclaim that vast territory for civilization, and rescue hundreds of thousands of tribesmen from the cruel despotism of the Khalifa. But it is not believed that any further advance will be made for the present. Wad Bishara succeeded in escaping, closely pursued, and, according to the latest advices, has not been captured. Among the emirs who fell into the hands of the Anglo-Egyptian troops were Hassan Neiumi and Abdul Diam. They say that the rule of the Khalifa will be completely broken by the repeated defeats of the Dervish forces, who, thus far, have failed almost entirely to inflict any loss upon the Anglo-Egyptian troops. In addition to the emirs and large numbers of Dervish soldiers who fell into the hands of the troops of the expedition. the latter captured six field guns, a largt quantity of ammunition, and great stores of grain, etc., besides many flocks of sheep, herds of cattle and many camels. Dongola will now be reconstructed on better lines the work of fortifying the posts, vinages Wady Halfa, over 200 miles distant, will be completed, and the railroad will be carried south to this point with all possible haste.

London, Sept. 24.-Judging from the tone of the Russian press, Russia does not like the prospect of England's gaining greater power Egypt, as she might be a menace to the powers using the Suez Canal. A growing party in military and Government circles is anxious that the Egyptian force should march to Khartoum.

#### MISSIONARIES WRECKED Their Special Schooner Goes Down-Picked Up by a Vessel.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 23 .- The South Sea missionary schooner Josephites Evanila has foundered at sea longitude 147 degress west, latitude 14 degrees 30 minutes south, July 26. The Evanila was sailing between Pomsto and Tahiti, when she was caught in a storm which so strained her that her seams opened and she filled and sank. Capt. McGrath, the cook, and several missionaries who were on board took to the small boats none too soon to save themselves from eing carried down with the wreck. After drifting about for 26 hours they were picked up by a southbound vessel and landed safely on the Island of Tahiti. The Evanila was built on this coast not long ago. It cost about \$40,000 to construct her and fit her out.
