Dr. Ryerson, one of the members for Toronto in the Provincial Legislature, made a speech the other day in the course of which he raised the question whether in Ontario the supporters of separate schools have any constitutional right to their privileges. Dr. Ryerson is a mephew of the tounder of our present school system, and it was at the instance of the late Rov. Dr. Ryerson that the Parliament of United Canadaagreed togrant to Roman Catholies the right to have separate schools in Upper Canada, and agreed at the same time to extend a similar privilege to the Protestant of Lower Canada. Lest any attempt might be made by their respective legislatures after confederation to withdraw it, a provision was inserted in the British North America Act, granting the right to separate schools privileges in perpetuity. This was done by the framers of the Confederation Act, prominent among whom was the late Sir John Macdonald, whose memory Dr. Ryerson still delights to honor. Dr. Ryerson, M.P.P., seems to have little respect for the memory of his greatuncle or the late leader of his party.
