Latest Decisions Delivered by the

Judges. Ottawa, June 26.—The Supreme Court of Canada met this morning to deliver judgments. Present: Sir Justice Sir Henry Strong, and Justices Taschereau, Groyune and Sedgwick. The following judgments were announced: Young vs. McNider, dismissed; McLean vs. McNider, dismissed: McLean vs. Stewart, allowed, Chief Justice and Taschereau dissenting; Archibald vs. Delisle, dismissed; Baker vs. Delisle, allowed; Moat vs. Delisle, dismissed; Robertson vs. Grand Trunk Railway, dismissed; Town of Colchester vs. Valad, dismissed, Groyune disenting; Bell vs. Wright, allowed; Northwest Transportation Company vs. McKenzie, dismissed, Taschereau dissenting; Toronto Railway Company vs. the Queen, dismissed, Chief Justice and Justice King dissenting; Lundy vs. Lundy, allowed, Taschereau dissenting; Donohue vs. Hill, al lowed; Belanger vs. Belanger, allowed Leggett vs. Hamilton dismissed; Banqueville Marie vs. Morrison, dis-

missed, Taschereau dissenting. In the case of Odell vs. G Odell entered suit against his wife for separation on the ground of her misconduct with two men, and obtained a judgment. The Court of Appeal set it aside on the ground of condonation: he had taken her back subsequent to the alleged offense. Odell then appealed to the Supreme Court, but was met by a motion to quash his appeal on the ground of want of jurisdiction. The court was unanimous in quashing the appeal. Odell has a bill of divorce in the Senate, where it was rejected by a narrow majority, on the ground that the case was pending before the court Whether it can now be proceeded with this session is a question. Mrs. Odell is charged with criminal conduct with a Quebec civil servant named Hamel, and a Montreal commercial traveler as her associates.
