Ministers Explain

Messrs. Balfour and Hanotaux Called on for Information.

In the British House of Commons and the French Chambers.

They State What They Choose to Make Public Regarding the Eastern Question.

Four Hours Fighting at Butsumari—European Soldiers among the Wounded—Mr. Gladstone and the Greeks.

London, April 6.—In the House of Commons yesterday, Sir William Harcourt asked whether the Turkish troops would be withdrawn from Crete, and whether the British forces would take part in a blockade of Greece. Upon these matters he desired the Government to make a definite statement and also to announce the policy of the Government in regard to Greece and Crete.

Mr. Balfour said the date of the withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Crete had not yet been fixed. In the meantime the powers were making a joint declaration to the Government at Athens, and to the Government at Constantinople, as the result of which the Greek frontier, the aggressor would be unanswerable for all the consequences of a disturbance of peace, which the powers attached the greatest importance, and also that whatever might be the result of a struggle, the country should know the powers would not consent that the aggressor should derive the slightest advantage therefrom. Mr. Balfour added that Great Britain would not hesitate to participate in a blockade of Greece, if such action should become necessary in the interests of peace.

Sir Wm. Harcourt said it was his desire that the country should know the policy of the Government more definitely than they did at present, and therefore gave notice that he would move an address to the Queen, praying that the forces of the crown might not be employed against the Greeks.
