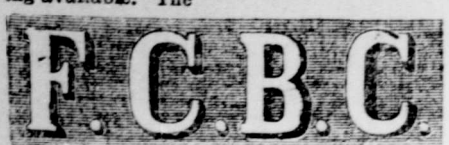


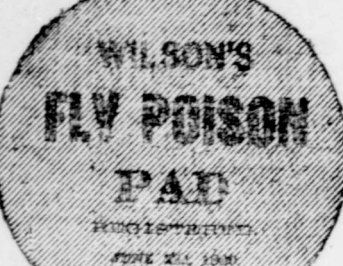

THE MACCABEES

Make Good Progress—Now Number Over Quarter of a Million.

Port Huron, Mich., July 22.—The Supreme Tent, Knights of the Maccabees, and Supreme Council, Ladies of the Maccabees, are meeting here.

Supreme Commander, D. D. Markey's report says:

"Our progress since last review has been satisfactory in every respect. We made a net increase in membership between May 1, 1895, and July 1, 1895, of 44,677. We have now 2,500 tents in good standing scattered over 45 states and provinces, while the total Maccabee membership (knights and ladies) July 1, 1895, was 275,181."

"At the present time we have invested the sum of \$251,812.50."

Mr. Markey declared that the supreme tent's laws be so amended as to include the organization of hives of the L. O. T. M. in Ontario.

Supreme Recorder, George Boynton, referring to the matter of new tents, says in his report: "This table shows that during the biennial term ending Dec. 31, 1895, 1,200 new tents were instituted, with a charter membership of 23,180. We have had 1,069 deaths in the supreme tent jurisdiction during the biennial term, being an average annually on the life benefit membership of 5.36 to each 1,000 life benefit members."

"A recapitulation table giving the number of certificates in force shows under supreme jurisdiction a total of 318,667, and total amount of life benefits in force at the close of the term, \$162,710,500."

"Under the head of assets at close of term, 1895, it is found that there was \$431,428.73 on hand, with liabilities of \$174,721.40, making net assets at the close of the term of \$256,707.33."

"The ladies of the Maccabees have enjoyed wonderful progress, admitting only 4,582, and making a net gain of 36,159 in the supreme hive and great hive of Michigan, and state hives of New York and Ohio."

In the Dining-Room.

FRIDAY, July 23. BREAKFAST—Cherries au naturel, Caramel flakes, Eggs in Surtout, Omelette, Coffee.

LUNCHEON—Veal croquettes, Thin bread and butter, Stewed currants, Iced tea.

DINNER—Baked haddock with sauce, Mashed potatoes, Cream of cauliflower, Egg salad, Devilled berries, Angel Food, Coffee.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Eggs in Surtout—Boil half a pound of bacon cut in thin slices and fry some bits of bread and butter, put three spoonfuls of egg in the dish; garnish the rim with fried bread, break some eggs in the middle, cover them with a rash of bacon and do them over a slow fire.

Omelette—This is a most delicious form of breakfast. Take two eggs, beat them, add a little salt, pepper, and a dash of milk. Take two cups of flour, put it in the bread-pan and make a hole in the middle of the pile drop into it the yolk of an egg; beat this up with a fork, then lift it up and pour it into the pan. Fry this very thin and cut in diamonds and fancy shapes with a pastry cutter, cutting two or three slits through the middle. Fry these a light brown in boiling lard and sift powdered sugar over them. They should be crispy and melting in one's mouth. Nice for luncheon or breakfast.

Baked Haddock with Sauce—Use a haddock or cod weighing about three pounds and remove the flesh from the bones in as large strips as possible, then scrape off the small pieces. The head and skeleton of a fish are very good. Lay some of the fish in the bottom of the dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, then a layer of the crumbs, and lay the rest of the fish, with a tablespoonful of butter cut in bits. This dish may stand a while before cooking or be set at once into the oven. When it is done it should be turned out onto a platter and be garnished if liked. It is an agreeable change from the usual way of baking a fish whole.

The Sauce—For the sauce, use the water in which the fish skeleton was simmered. Cook together a tablespoonful of each of flour and butter and dilute with the fish stock or milk, if desired. Add a dash of salt and a dash of pepper. Boil for five minutes, then add a dash of vinegar and a dash of lemon juice. Heat three-quarters of a cup of milk and beat two eggs yolks with a fork. Mix with the egg & half-

teaspoonful of mustard, one-half teaspoonful of salt, a teaspoonful of granulated gelatine that has been softened in little cold water, a teaspoonful of sugar and a few grains of cayenne. Cook a tablespoonful of butter and flour together and add half a cup of vinegar. Now cook the milk and egg mixture together like a soft custard and combine with the other part. This dressing, if sealed tight, will keep a long time. When the cabbage and dressing are mixed, fill little individual molds and set away to cool. After dinner coffee cups, wet in cold water, make good molds. Bits of red beet or hard olive put in the bottom of the mold before the cabbage is put in will make a pretty garnish when the salad is turned out.

—An interesting reminder of the street improvements (?) London possessed half a century ago was discovered yesterday on Ridout street, north of Dundas. While excavating for the new sewer workmen came across a portion of the cordon which was laid in the early forties. The logs were about three feet in diameter, and as sound as when laid. They have to be chopped out, and will cause some delay if many should happen to be in the line of the sewer.

—An important departure has been made by the management of the Grand Trunk Railway from the usual custom of obtaining supplies of uniforms for employees entirely from one firm in Montreal. The new plan is to obtain the uniforms at the various divisional headquarters. The company of the London district has been awarded to O. Labelle. The new uniform of the conductors includes a sack coat instead of the skirted coat, as at present. The brakemen on passenger trains will be clothed similarly to the Pullman porters.

—Mr. W. J. Doherty, of this city, treasurer of the Provincial Christian Endeavor Union, is sending out a report which shows that the deficit has been reduced to \$50. It is officially announced by Mr. Thomas Morris, jun., provincial secretary, that two banners will be awarded at the annual provincial convention. One will be given to the county union sending in the largest percentage of reports from its societies, and the other to the county union having the largest percentage of societies within the county connected with the union and sending in reports.

—Tenders for kalsomining, painting, glazing and plastering in the public schools, the laying of a maple floor in one room in King street school, and the placing of new ceiling in two rooms in Victoria school, were dealt with last night by No. 2 committee of the board of education. Mr. E. Winder secured the contract for the first named work, his price being \$160. Mr. E. J. Orendorff's tender of \$34.30 for the maple floor in King street was 70 cents lower than the figure of four other contractors, and he will do the work. Mr. Winder will put up metal ceilings in Victoria school for \$34. The only other tender for the job was made by Parkinson & Co., at \$87. Trustees Burdick (chairman), Evans, McCormick, Bayly and Dr. Campbell and the secretary were the members of the committee in attendance.

CHOSEN FRIENDS' EXCURSION.

Of the big excursion of Chosen Friends from this city yesterday, the Sarnia Observer says: "Wednesday, July 21, was the day picked upon for the annual excursion to Detroit of the Chosen Friends' Society of London. This excursion has come to be a household word with many Londoners, and every year is taken advantage of by large crowds of people, all anxious to enjoy a pleasant outing either at Sarnia or on the waters between here and the city of the Straits. This year was no exception to the rule, and at 8:45 o'clock this morning a special train of twelve first-class coaches and a baggage car was pulled into the Crownwell street depot by engine No. 775, with Driver Chapman and Fireman Copeland at the controls. The train left London at 8:45 o'clock and arrived here at the hour above mentioned, making the run from London to Sarnia in two hours. General Jack Gilean of London, was the conductor in charge of the excursion train, and had for his assistants, Brakenridge Johnson and Campbell, of the same city, and a more attentive or gentlemanly car could not be found on the Grand Trunk system. The train had five hundred and fifty passengers aboard, and on its arrival here was run up to Clark's wharf, where the excursionists disembarked and boarded the steamer city of Toledo, which was waiting, and ten minutes after the arrival of the train the steamer was on her way to Detroit. By actual count

311 passengers went aboard the City of Toledo. Most of the excursionists arrived home here last night."
