

Havana, July 22 .- Of the \$50,000 appropriated by Congress to feed the starving Americans in Cuba only a small fraction has been drawn, not for ack of a crying need, but by reason of the iron-bound restrictions of the state department on Consul-General Lee's distribution agents.

The sum given each person is just enough to sustain life, but apparently no thought is given to other wants. The amount of relief, only 12 cents & day for each person, just scheduled aid. This relief barely feeds the naturalized citizens and entirely discounts their other wants.
