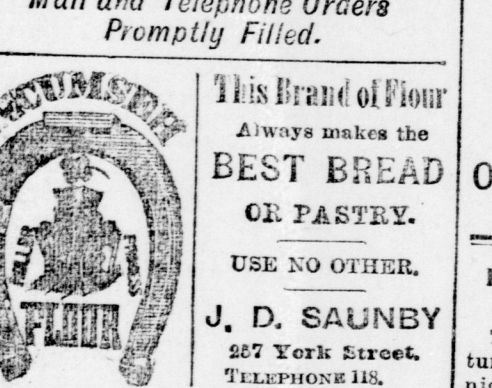

FINE-COLD-SNOW FLURRIES.

TORONTO, Jan. 24—11 p.m.—The disturbance in the Mississippi Valley last night has since passed over the lower lakes, giving snow and rain, and in some bringing snow and rain throughout Eastern Canada. The area of greatest pressure has been transferred to the Missouri Valley, and its accompanying cold wave is spreading quickly eastward.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 18° below—20° below; Qu'Appelle, 38° below—6° below; Winnipeg, 40° below—18° below; Port Arthur, 20° below—8° below; Toronto, 23°—38°; Montreal, 6°—40°; Quebec, 2° below—28°; Halifax, 14°—36°.

TORONTO, Jan. 25—1 a.m.—Probabilities for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far east as Belleville) are: Northwest to west winds, strong during the day; fine and decidedly cold; a few local snow flurries.

—Mr. E. D. Mack, of Toronto, is visiting Mr. A. J. Watson and other East London friends.

—Mr. Robt. Boston, M. P. for South Middlesex, went down to the dairymen's convention at Woodstock to-day.

—A coolness has arisen between the Provinces of Ontario and Manitoba—it's 46 degrees below zero in Winnipeg.

—Mr. J. A. Waddell, insurance agent, St. Thomas, has removed to London, where he will study medicine at the Medical College.

—Local curlers have been practicing in the Simcoe street rink during the past few nights.

—President Wanless, of the Young Liberal Club, is among the enthusiasts this year.

—The officers of the Seventh have been engaged the last few evenings sorting over the clothing of their respective companies.

It was learned to-day from an officer of the battalion that some of the companies will need but very light supplies.

—Major Stacey has been notified that permission has been granted for the admission of Sergeants John Sutton, John Foxton and Walter Symons and Corp. William James, of the Twenty-fifth Battalion, to attend the Royal School of Infantry at London.—[St. Thomas Times.]

—Mrs. E. B. Smith, of Queen's avenue, was one of the guests at the reception given by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Mills and Mrs. J. B. Young at Hamilton on Tuesday night.

—Village Constable Ward, of London West, returned from Melbourne last night, where he was investigating a case of cattle stealing. Colter was brought before Squire Clark and bailed to appear before Magistrate Lacey on Jan. 31.

Coal Oil.

A correspondent in Paris Station takes exception to the statement made by Mr. Isaac Waterman at Ottawa that coal oil was supplied to the retailer at 6½ cents per imperial gallon. He says that the lowest quotation in car lots in London is 9½ and 10 cents, and that it cost him 12 cents per cent, by no means an unreasonable profit, considering necessary losses by leakage and other causes.

Coal oil, like other highly protected articles, seems to have a margin of profit so large that prices can be varied up and down to suit localities or to furnish protection arguments.

Young Liberals' Concert.

The Young Liberal Club rooms were crowded to their utmost capacity last night with a merry throng. All came to enjoy a concert, and they were more than pleased at the amusement of various kinds supplied. The president, Mr. Burr, presided in the chair and conducted the proceedings in his usual happy style.

The programme was varied, and consisted of songs by Messrs. Simon, A. Furness, F. Saunders, J. Kira and T. Rankin, recitation by W. McLeod, and a number of quartets and choruses. Mr. E. Burness presided at the piano to the satisfaction of all.

Small Fires.

The firemen were kept pretty busy last night. About 8 o'clock a fire was discovered in a box car on the C. P. R., just east of the freight sheds. The car was loaded with potatoes, a box stove being placed in one end. The heat from the stove doubtless caused the blaze, which was extinguished before the brigade arrived. The damage was light.

The firemen had just returned from the previous run, and had everything cleaned, when they were again called out. At 10:10 P. C. Woolway noticed a light in Joseph Rankin's cigar store, Richmond street, near King. The door was broken open and the fire discovered behind a tobacco cutter near the wall. The brigade turned out, but a stream of water was unnecessary. The damage was about \$15.

Rev. J. H. Robinson.

In the Christian Guardian of this week is the following, which will be interesting to all citizens of London who in former years were acquainted with that sturdy, honest and able man, the Rev. J. H. Robinson:

"This venerable minister, long and affectionately known by those who formerly belonged to the New Connexion section of the great Methodist Church of Canada, and who for many years filled the offices of general superintendent and connexional editor, and was widely known throughout what was formerly called Canada West as a preacher of uncommon eloquence and power, has been superannuated for years. Many of his old friends since his retirement have anxiously inquired of his whereabouts."

"He resides with his son-in-law, Prof. Saunders, at Ottawa. He lately reached his 86th year, and since a severe illness two years ago he has been very feeble in health. He is not able to stand alone, and for the last six years has not been able to read, being blind from cataract on both eyes. His mind is remarkably vigorous, and by hearing friends read to him he keeps himself informed on current events of the day. His heart is not withered with age, but young and fresh as ever. He is deeply interested in the great movements of the age, but, like the prophet of old, he 'prefers Jerusalem above his chief joy.'"

"Who is in daily communication with her loved father, in a letter to me, dated Jan. 5, writes: 'He is not at all tired of life, although it appears to outsiders as if his lot is rather hard. No word of complaint ever escapes his lips. Nothing but love, thankfulness and hope occupies his mind. His cheerful, happy disposition is a blessing to all of us. He rests satisfied in the hands of his heavenly Father, waiting to respond to the call when it may come.'"
