Frightful Railway Collision in Austria. VIENNA, Jan. 4 .- A passenger train from this city collided at Kanizsa to-day with passenger train from Stuhlweissenburg. In the crash the locomotive of the freight plowed through three carriages filled with passengers, eight of whom were killed, five sustained injuries of which they will probably die, and ten were severely wounded.
