turned from Cleveland with passengers and freight. This was her first trip for the season. It was a most delightful one. Mr. T. F. Hawkins, of Youngstown, Ohio, met Capt. Ellison in Cleveland to arrange for a large party of 100 Youngstown people to come to Port Stanley in July, and camp where they did last year east of the village at what was known as "Square's Rest," for at least two months, and Mr. Hawkins also arranged to run an excursion from Youngstown to Port Stanley, when 200 will come over just for a few days. A Delicate Question Settled.

Apres to the meeting of the annual military camps this year, the question as to whether a volunteer is compelled to salute an officer in meeting one on the street clad as a civilian is being discussed. The adjutant-general has given it as his opinion that the salute to be taken under such circumstances was entirely optional with the former. While it was proper for a private who knew an officer to salute the latter at such times, this was not obligatory. The institution of a regulation which would necessitate the recognition by a private of an officer—far below him probably in social position—when he might meet on the street a dozen times a day, would be absurd and useless.
