Temperature on Tuesday Rose to 106 Degrees in the Shade.

The Century Mark Reached in Philadelphia and Nearly Touched in New York--- Away Up in Nineties in Many Places --- Appalling List of Deaths and Prostrations.

Washington, July 2.-Reports receiv- and sixty prostrations from the heat from throughout the entire area affected by the intense heat show a continuation of very high temperatures save in a few favored localities. Generally speaking, the thunderstorms have come have been what is known as 'dry storms," so that very little rain

106° IN THE SHADE. Phoenix, Ariz., had the highest temperature today, the thermometer registering 106, while at Philadelphia it was again at 102, at Atlantic City 96, Boston 94; Chicago, where over an inch of rain fell, 86; Cincinnati, 92; Davenport, Iowa, 92; Des Moines, 94; Indianapolis, 94; Kansas City, 100; Little Rock, Ark., 96; Memphis, Tenn., 94; New Orleans, 92; New York, 98; North Platte, Neb., 93; Pitsburg, 92; Springfield, Ill., 96; Vicksburg, 94. At Washington the maximum was 100, but during a gust in the afternoon the thermometer fell 15 degrees in as many minutes.

Numerous prostrations and deaths were reported from heat, and many industrial plants were forced to suspend operations.

SCORES OF DEATHS. At Pittsburg, 50 deaths and 70 prostrations were reported up to 9 p.m. At St. Louis 4 deaths and 33 prostraions had occurred up to 9 p.m. At Newark, N. J., 31 deaths and 66 prostrations were reported up to 9 Tuesday, July 9, at 1:30 p.m.

In Hoboken, N. J., 8 deaths were reported and 52 prostrations. Jersey City escaped lightly, with less than half a dozen deaths and about 20 cases of prostration. Six deaths took place at Elizabeth,

where there are 15 cases of prostration reported. Troy, N. Y., six deaths and seven prostrations; temperature 100. Syracuse, two death; temperature

MINIMUM TEMPERATURES. Washington, July 2. - Almost as interesting as the temperature for today is the showing the weather bureau reports make for the minimum temperature during the past 24 hours, indicating the sweltering conditions during the night. At Baltimore it was never less

than 84 during the night; Philadelphia, never less than 86; New York, 82; Washington, 80, and St. Louis, 82. St. Louis showed the highest minimum temperature in the west. Fortunately the humidity throughout the heat wave region, according to the weather bureau, has remained proctically normal, The weather bureau holds out some hope for temporary relief in sections, but vouchsafes no assurance of an immediate permanent break anywhere.

Narrow Escape of Robert Howard of 570 Horton Street.

Removing Curbing From Well and Sides Fell In, Burying Him for Nearly Two Hours.

Robert Howard, a man about 30 years old, was buried by the caving in of a well about 11:30 this morning, and although underground for 11/2 hours, escaped serious injury. Howard was employed as a teamster by Geo. Rendell, the coal dealer, and this morning was sent by the latter to his former residence at the southeast corner of York and William streets to take the brick curbing out of an unused well. Howard was working at the bottom of the well, when the loosened earth caved in, crushing him between the wall of the well and a ladder by which he had descended. S. R. May, who was with Howard at the time, gave the alarm, and willing hands undertook the task of freeing the imprisoned man, which was accomplished about 1 o'clock. ONLY SLIGHT RELIEF FROM THE HEAT!

Ninety-One Deaths Due to the Hot Wave at Philadelphia.

New England Credits the Thermal Wave With Causing 100 Fatalities-Mercury Climbing Up Again.

Washington, July 3 .- Louisville and Baltimore were the two hottest cities in the United States at? 8 o'clock this morning, according to official figures, the thermometers at that hour registering 84 degrees in both places. Their closest competitors for first honors are Boston, New York, Philadelphia and Scranton in the east; Charleston and Savannah in the South, and Cincinnati and Kansas city in the west, all with 82 recorded at that early hour of

the day. THE DOMINION'S CUSTOMS REVENUE.

An Increase of \$81,000 for the Fiscar

Year. Ottawa, July 3 .- The actual amount received at the accountant's office, Ottawa, as customs revenue for June last was \$2,340,201, an increase of \$148,463 over the same month of last year, when

the receipts were \$2,191,737. For the fiscal year ending June 50, the revenue was \$81,236 in excess of the preceding twelve months. The figures are: 1901, \$28,990,254; 1900, \$28,909,-018. The receipts from customs duties at outlying points, which will probably amount to \$100,000, have yet to be received. When these are in hand they will make the aggregate increase of revenue for the year \$200,000.

This is an excellent showing, more especially when it is remembered that there was an 8 per cent decrease in the duties on British goods last year, as compared with the year previous. The customs revenue has increased by about \$9,000,000 since 1896. In that year the customs receipts were \$20,219,-037, in 1897, \$19,891,996, in 1898, \$22,157 - 788, in 1899, \$25,734,228, in 1900, \$28,-

909,018, and 1901, \$28,990,254. THE TWELVE MONTHS TOTALED \$390,000
