LITTLE ADDITIONAL LIGHT THROWN ON NINHAM'S DEATH

Uneventful Session of Inquest on Saturday Night

Men Named Brown and Cummings Seen at Hotel

One Witness Admitted He Was "Pretty Drunk," and That He Lied to Constables.

The seventh session of the Ninham inquest, held on Saturday evening, failed to bring the inquiry to the conclusion which it was thought would have been reached in two or three sittings.

Eight witnesses were called, but all of them failed to throw any bright light on the mystery which surrounds the death of Gus Ninham.

Four of the witnesses were members of the party of seven which visited Sharkey's hotel at a late hour on the night of June 21. Their stories in the main coincided with that which Wm. Worrall, one of their companions, told on Friday night. All seemed hazy on the question of time, some thinking they arrived at Sharkey's shortly after 11:30, while others fixed the time as nearer midnight. One of them corroborated Worrall's statement as to there being three men in the sitting room, into which the party went at Sharkey's, and recognized one of the three as a man named Cummings.

Two others of these four witnesses could not remember seeing any man named Brown in the sitting room, but said they saw Cummings and a man named Brown in an adjoining sitting-room. All agreed that Sharkey gave them no liquor. No less than three of the witnesses swore that they slept during a large part of the drive, and one of them confessed that he could not recollect being assisted from the rig at the G. T. R. station by any of his surroundings from the time he went to sleep in the rig till he woke in the morning in the draughtsman's party on York street.

Some of the spectators and jury by his frank confession that he was "pretty drunk," not only on the night of Ninham's death, but also on the subsequent night when he was interrogated by the constables, to whom he told untruths because he thought "it was none of their business."

Two witnesses were called to testify as to the condition of the driver, an Indian at the Grand Central Hotel, but as one of them was absent from the hotel at the time that the accident took place, the other was confined to his room upstairs, neither saw anything of the fight, and did not even hear there had been one. From the questions put by the crown and answered by the witness, it was apparent that he was supposed to have been making mysterious hints about Ninham's death, but nothing was elicited from the witness to give credence to such a charge. Altogether Saturday night's session was the least productive of sensational developments of any yet held.

ADMITTED HE WAS DRUNK.

The first witness heard was James Fox, familiarly known as "Bruze" Fox. Fox said he was at Sharkey's hotel on the night of Saturday, June 21. The bartender at the Boswell House had driven him out of the back sitting-room at 11:15 p.m. he being drunk at the time. Outside he met six young men and drove to Sharkey's. They left the city immediately after 11:15.

Witness was positive he had told no one that he was drunk after 12 o'clock when the party left for Sharkey's.

LIED TO THE CONSTABLE.

If witness had told High Constable McLeod that it was after 12 o'clock when the party left the city, it was so he. He was drunk at the time, and so he was not to say anything. He was always liable to lie to the police. He was telling the truth to the coroner and jury, he said, because he was on his oath.

When the party arrived at Sharkey's they all went into a room, and after a little while Sharkey, a man, came in and told them there was nothing to do, and to get out. Witness did not know what room they were in, as he had only been at Sharkey's once before, and besides he was too drunk to know.

He admitted that that evening he was sober now. "I've had three or four drinks," answered the witness.

TRIED TO PUMP HIM.

Asked further about his statements to the constables, witness said: "I never told the high constable any lie. I was drinking when he came over to a hotel and bought me a drink to try and pump me."

High Constable McLeod bought him a drink on Tuesday last, said witness, and on leaving him gave him 15 cents to get more drink. Constable Ward gave witness 10 cents on Monday to get a drink. When the constable served witness with his subpoena on Saturday he bought him another drink.

SLEPT IN THE RIG.

Witness went to sleep in the rig just after leaving Sharkey's, and slept till the London View Hotel was reached. He saw no Indians around Sharkey's, and did not see Jack McArthur.

LEFT CITY AT 11:20.

Patrick White, of 8 Regent street, was the next member of the driving party to take the stand. He said he was at Sharkey's hotel on the night of Saturday, June 21. He got into a Gladstone with six others opposite Michael, John Store, Wm. Worrall, and Geo. McLean. Witness was at Maple street with the other four about 15 minutes, watching the corner about 10:45, and leaving it at 11:20.
