FOUGHT TO GET THROUGH GATES

RIOT FOR COAL

North End Coal Yard Was Besieged by Anxious Citizens-Plan to Supply the Poor.

Boston, Dec. 11.-Hundreds of the residents of the north end besieged the entrance to the yard of the Metropolitan Coal Company, Causeway street, yesterday, and at one time there

was a small-sized coal riot. So much trouble was caused by the fight for a chance to get through the gates that a wagonload of coal in bags was hauled out of the yard and distributed from the opposite side of the street to draw a part of the crowd

away from the gates.

Hardly had the driver pulled up his horses before the crowd was upon his wagon. Men and women pulled one another and fought for a chance to get at the coal. Patrolmen were called on to aid the driver, and it was only with the greatest difficulty and by using force that they were able to keep the bags from being stolen and

carried away. The riot was checked by the arrival of other policemen, and the wagon was again hauled inside the gates, where the throng could not get at it.



RECIPROCITY **FAVORING**

Strong Resolution Passed at the Detroit Convention.

Congress Urged to Take Action in Regard to the Matter.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 12.-The delegates to the National Reciprocity Convention adopted resolutions, listened to an able address on reciprocity by exheard the report of the finance committee and aujourned sine die. At the morning session Lugene N. Foss, of Boston, discussed "Canadian Reciprocity," and Frank D. Pavey, of New York, spoke on "Reciprocity With The resolutions adopted are as follows:

"Resorved, that we reaffirm the resolutions adopted at the first convention of this league at Chicago, which emciple of reciprocity and the establishment of liberal fair trade relations with all the nations of the world, and that we again call attention to the reciprocity treaties negotiated by ex-Minister Kasson, including the very important treaty with France; and we again request that these treaties be ratified, and also that a reciprocity treaty with Cuba be speedily negoti-ated and ratified."

Ex-Governor Lind declared he could see no more reason for a trade barrier between Canada and the United States than between various States of the union Canada is not materially different from this country, he said, and there is just an artificial and arbitrary boundary line between the two He concluded by saying: "If it had not been for the selfishness and shortsightedness of New England statesmen economically, politically and socially, at a time when the great west was not the power it now is in Congress, the United States and Canada would be one country, so far as trade relations are concerned."
