TIME FOR A VISIT OF THE TORNADO

on M. Loubet's Trip. End to End by Wind

No Hitch in Atlantic Shipping Combine-White Star Line Shareholders Satisfied.

London, May 21 .- In a dispatch from St. Petersburg the correspondent of the Daily Mail says that President Loubet could hardly have chosen a more unfavorable moment for his visit. "Apart from the labor and student revolt," says the correspondent,

there is the trouble which arose during the recent riots in Moscow between a Frenchman and the police, which led to energetic interference by the French ambassador, with the result that the positions of Grand Duke George, the governor of Moscow, and M. Trepoff, the chief of police, are said to be menaced."

Shortly after this trouble the Grand Duke Vladimir declined to attend the parade arranged in honor of President Loubet, saying he was not to be or-dered about by a "hole-and-corner law-yer." Grand Duke Vladimir accordingy transferred the chief command to Gen. Rehbinder. The czar then inter-fered and appointed Grand Duke Nicholas to the chief command. THE STEAMER TRUST.

There is no hitch in the arrangenents of the Atlantic shipping combine. The White Star Line shareholders have unanimously accepted the Morgans' offer. The government has received assurances that the White Star will gladly renew the naval reserve agreement at the expiration of the present three years' contract.

FRONTIER FIGHTING. The tension of the Turkish frontier has resulted in two more fights between Turkish and Bulgarian troops, and the deaths of five soldiers, says a Sofia cablegram. On May 17 a Bulgarian frontier guard surprised two Turkish soldiers on Bulgarian soil near the village of Rilo, and killed both the Turks as they were trying May 18 some other Turkiel soldiers tried forcibly to recover the bodies of the two men killed May 17. In this engagement three Turks were killed and one Bulgarian was wounded. A judicial report of these occurrences has been drawn up, but the Turkish representatives refused to sign the document.

CHINESE INDEMNITY.

A Pekin dispatch says: The foreign ministers have decided to divide the installments of the Chinese war indemnity, provisionally on the of a pro rata reduction of the excess. They have also unanimously decided to instruct the bankers' commission to inform the taotai of Shanghai that the argument to the effect that the indemnity is payable on a silver basis is untenable. Sir Robert Hart, director of the maritime customs of China, concurred in this opinion. The bankers recently requested the taotai to advise them of the progress made in collecting the indemnity, and he replied, substantially, that it was none of the bankers' concern, so long as China met the payments.

Gon. Gomez Assisted Gen. Wood to Raise the New Republic's Flag

Charleston, S. C., May 20,-At noon today the Cuban flag was raised over the West Indian building at the Charleston Exposition by the Cuban commissioners, and a salute of 21 guns fired in honor of the birth of the Cuban republic. Short speeches were made by members of the commission and officials of the exposition. AT HAVANA.

Havana, May 20 .- The ceremonies in cosnection with the inauguration of the Cuban republic yesterday (as already referred to) were of a most interesting character. STATUE OF FREEDOM.

Much curiosity was aroused by a statue of Freedom, which had been raised during the night in Central Park, upon the pedestal where for centuries a statue of Queen Isabella had stood. As the day advanced the heat became intense.

The actual transfer of the control of the island was scheduled to occur ex-actly at noon, Havana time, which is 12:30 p.m. Washington time, but those invited to witness the ceremony were requested to be at the palace at 11:30 a.m.

THE TRANSFER.

For centuries the palace was the residence of the captains-general of Spain. Since the American occupation it has been the official headquarters of the military governor. It was in the audience room of this edifice that the actual transfer occurred.
