AN UNFAVORABLE TIME FOR A VISIT

British Newspaper Comment on M. Loubet's Trip.

RUSSIA HAS TROUBLE AT HOME

No Hitch in Atlantic Shipping Combine—White Star Line Shareholders Satisfied.

London, May 21.—In a dispatch from St. Petersburg the correspondent of the Daily Mail says that President Loubet could hardly have chosen a more unfavorable moment for his visit. "Apart from the labor and student revolt," says the correspondent, "there is the trouble which arose during the recent riots in Moscow between a Frenchman and the police, which led to energetic interference by the French ambassador, with the result that the positions of Grand Duke George, the governor of Moscow, and M. Trepoft, the chief of police, are said to be menaced."

Shortly after this trouble the Grand Duke Vladimir declined to attend the parade arranged in honor of President Loubet, saying he was not to be ordered about by a "hole-and-corner lawyer." Grand Duke Vladimir accordingly transferred the chief command to Gen. Rehbinder. The car then entered the city and the Grand Duke Nicholas to the chief command.

THE STEAMER TRUST.
There is no hitch in the arrangements of the Atlantic shipping combine. The White Star Line shareholders have unanimously accepted the Morgan's offer. The government has received assurances that the White Star will gladly renew the naval reserve agreement at the expiration of the present five years' contract.

FRONTIER FIGHTING.
The tension of the Turkish frontier has resulted in two more fights between Turkish and Bulgarian troops, and the deaths of five soldiers, says a Sofia cablegram. On May 17 a Bulgarian frontier guard surprised two Turkish soldiers on Bulgarian soil near the village of Rilo, and killed both the Turks as they were trying to escape. May 18 some other Turkish soldiers tried forcibly to recover the bodies of the two men killed May 17. In this engagement three Turks were killed and one Bulgarian was wounded. A judicial report of these occurrences has been drawn up, but the Turkish representatives refused to sign the document.

CHINESE INDEMNITY.
A Pekin dispatch says: The foreign ministers have decided to divide the indemnities of the Chinese war indemnity, provisionally on the basis of a pro rata reduction of the excesses they have also unanimously decided to instruct the bankers' commission to inform the taotai of Shanghai that the argument to the effect that the indemnity is payable on silver basis is untenable. Sir Robert Hart, director of the maritime customs of China, concurred in this opinion. The bankers' commission has been asked to advise them of the progress made in collecting the indemnity, and he replied, substantially, that it was none of the bankers' concern, so long as it is paid in specie.

Although it is by no means a slack season with the agriculturist, an audience of more than 2,000 gathered in the drill hall and listened to the exposition of his and progressive politics in an attitude of intense interest which showed the impression the subject has made upon the people.

Free, as usual, from all bitterness, from all personalities, the premier's address was a model expository effort, lauding the resources of Ontario and explaining the simple business view adopted by the government in their development.

The meeting was jointly in the interest of Mr. W. A. Charlton, Liberal candidate in South Norfolk, and Mr. E. C. Carpenter, the candidate in North Norfolk.

TERRIBLE HAVOC OF THE TORNADO

Goliad, Texas, Swept From End to End by Wind

AND 150 HOUSES DEMOLISHED

Ninety-Two Persons Were Killed and Over a Hundred Injured—Waterspout in Kentucky.

Goliad, Texas, May 21.—Ninety-two dead and one hundred and three injured is the result of the terrible work of Sunday's tornado. The town was literally swept from end to end by the wind, and 150 houses were demolished.

A revised list of the dead shows that 28 whites perished. The remainder of the dead are negroes. Of the injured it is believed that 20 will die.

In response to the appeal of Governor Sayers, subscriptions have been raised in many of the larger cities, and food and other necessities are now on the way here. Reports from various portions of the state show the damage from the storm was widespread. At Ben Hur three persons, it is reported, were killed.

WIND PLAYED HAVOC.
Duluth, Minn., May 20.—A wind storm of great violence visited Duluth last night. Several people were injured. The wind played havoc in the lumber districts, where thousands of feet of sawed lumber was blown a great distance. Several small buildings were overturned, and on Minnesota Point numerous trees were blown down. The shipping in the harbor was blown about. Many valuable records of the Government engineer's office were destroyed by a flood of water.

WATERSPOUT IN KENTUCKY.
Cincinnati, Ohio, May 21.—A severe storm swept over this locality yesterday, and there was a waterspout in the Lewisburg Hills, just south of Covington, Ky., which caused a wave of water twenty feet deep to come down the hill and submerge the valley. The frame house of a family named Millers was carried over four blocks and dashed to pieces against the Covington ball park grandstand.

The bodies of Mrs. Millen and her child have been recovered. It is thought that several other lives have been lost. The weather bureau there reported the velocity of the wind at 53 miles per hour and the rainfall at 2 1/2 inches.

RESERVOIR BREAKS.
Connellsville, Pa., May 21.—The Breakneck reservoir, near here, in the mountains, broke yesterday morning and the five-million gallon lake flooded White Run Valley, sweeping away houses, barns, bridges, barns, fences and crops. As far as known no lives were lost. The damage is estimated at \$200,000.

The break was caused by a cloud-burst.

BRIDGES AND TRACK WASHED AWAY.
Calgary, N. W. T., May 20.—Heavy rain storms are causing serious damage in this section of the country, and at Indian Head several bridges have been washed away, and many washouts on the railway track are reported. Another heavy rain set in last night. There is a washout eight miles east here, and the approaches to the Bow River bridge are gone, together with 150 feet of track.
