Some of the owners had a number of boats hung up in the Thames. One firm had seventeen steamers, each of 500 tons and over, and another four-teen large vessels. The loss to these two owners alone through non-working amounts to several thousand pounds. In addition, many valuable charters have had to be canceled, and as long-voyage charters are frequently worth a couple of thousand pounds the oss from this cause is heavy enough. The shipowners' bill for the week is probably heavier than the under-
