\$5,000 MORE FOR SANATORIUM

City Council Voted to Hand Over Money Provided for By Debentures. The council last night agreed to ask special legislation to empower them to grant the \$5,000 debentures voted by the people for a consumption hospital, to the London Health Association for the purpose of erecting a sanatorium. A large deputation, headed by Hon. Adam Beck, appeared before the council, and addressed that body on the scheme, and after the arguments were heard, the council decided to make the grant. The council last night agreed to ask special legislation to empower them to grant the \$5,000 debentures voted by the people for a consumption hospital, to the London Health Association for the purpose of erecting a sanatorium. THE HARRISTON WRECK

Jury's Verdict in Case Which Caused Death of Trainmen. Harriston, Feb. 1.—The jury inquiring into the death of the trainmen killed in the collision here last week returned a verdict to the effect that the crew of the northbound freight guilty of negligence and caused the Grand Trunk for permitting an inexperienced engineer to be in charge of the train. The jury also found that the failure of the part of Engineer Conrad Kennedy, of the northbound train, to give the proper signals for the switch. "We also find that Matthew Kennedy, the conductor, was at fault in that he failed to have a proper lookout and to have a brakeman properly placed when the train crossed the C. P. Diamond at the Owen Sound switch. "Notwithstanding the neglect of the conductor we find that the fireman and brakeman on the train are not free from responsibility. "The G. T. R. was also at fault in putting the train in charge of John Kennedy, who was not sufficiently familiar with the run and the signals, as shown in the evidence." 79c

CLEVELAND'S CAR FARES.

Cleveland, Feb. 1.—In accordance with instructions of the court to the receivers of the entire street railway system of this city the rate of fare was increased from three cents to five beginning this morning on all lines except those with the franchisees specifically provided a rate of not more than three cents. Therefore approximately two-thirds of the street car patrons today are paying a straight five-cent fare. Tickets for fifty and ten-cent fares obtainable free transfers to any line in the city. 79c
