ONTARIO TRADE BOARDS TALK RECIPROCITY

Resolution Against It Passed at the Toronto Convention.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—By a vote of 95 to 18 the annual meeting of the Associated Boards of Trade of Ontario this afternoon passed a strong resolution condemning the reciprocity agreement with the United States.

The resolution was moved by President E. S. Gourlay, of the board of trade, and seconded by Hon. E. J. Davis, of Newmarket, a member of the late federal government of Ontario.

The closing feature of the convention was an address by Justice Riddell, who spoke on behalf of the public of Ontario. The speaker avoided any consideration or reference to the question of tariff, but reviewed the history and resources of the province, and pointed out the principles which should govern the country's great nation.

At the morning session a resolution urging the government to deepen the Welland Canal was carried, only eight New Ontario representatives voting against it.

Mr. Steinbock, of Stratford, favored reciprocity. "It will work out to the benefit of the agricultural class, 75 per cent of the population, and whatever benefits them will benefit other classes."

"If the dealers in butter, cheese and eggs are shut out of that market of \$200,000,000," said he, "do not think that they will be contented."

"On average he said the prices had been several cents a pound lower than they were in the United States."

To have a happy community, we must have peace, plenty and contentment. I am in favor of this because it gives our producers that large market and does not seriously affect manufactures.

"The United States had the experience of a high tariff, and as a result wealth in that country was found in few hands."

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 22.—An automobile full of six went over a 23-foot embankment at West Liberty, near here, this morning, and two women, Mamie Croger, aged 22, and Annie McDonald, aged 28, were dangerously injured. Four men, including the chauffeur, escaped injury. The car, a 1910 model, was overturned and the two women under the machine in the water. The car was almost crushed in the cold water before they were rescued by a motor man of a street car.

OPPN. SCORES OVER WHITNEY

Secure Consideration of Bill to Curb Reckless Chauffeurs.

GOVT. WOULD WITHDRAW

The Municipality Improvements Measures Goes to Legislative Committee.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Toronto, Feb. 22.—When Mr. Valen, the Stocks bill amending the motor vehicles act came up for its second reading yesterday in the legislature, there was a little contest between the Government and the Opposition, in which the latter came off best.

Hon. Mr. Hanna, provincial secretary, wanted Mr. Stock to withdraw the bill, on the ground that legislation last session had covered all that was involved in the proposed amendment. It was finally postponed, however, by the Government, on the points as to whether the present law applies to owners of automobiles operating their own machines, and whether a driver's license or owner's permit should be cancelled on the second or third conviction during twelve months. Mr. Stock's bill provided for such penalties on the second conviction. The members for South Perth made a strong appeal on behalf of his bill as being not only in the interest of the farmers and country residents, but also for the automobile owners and manufacturers. His aim was to put an end to the reckless chauffeur or operator.

No Penalty.

Mr. Stock pointed out that there was no penalty provided for an operator who had his license or permit withdrawn for a second or third conviction. With him to produce on demand. Hon. Mr. Hanna said the requirement to produce the license or permit practically meant he must have it on him at all times. Mr. Stock said his bill would make short work of the reckless drivers, and would the sooner make the farmers friends of the automobile.

Woodstock Liberal Club.

Mr. W. Proudfoot, M. P. for Centre Huron, has given notice.

He intends to introduce in the legislature a bill which aims to relieve the overcrowding in street cars in large cities. "He the pockets of the community," he thinks, "is the most satisfactory plan. His bill provides that in cities of over 50,000, where a passenger has to stand and is not provided for each person, he or she shall only be bound to pay two cents. Mr. Proudfoot thought of making it half-fare, but the majority of the committee thought that with the different tickets used in cities such as Toronto, made a half-fare rate impracticable.

GOING TO EGYPT TO TAKE EVIDENCE

London Loan Company Interested in Case About Petrolia Lands

Toronto, Feb. 22.—A commission has been directed by Master-in-Chancery Cartwright to proceed to the banks of the Red Sea, to John Josh, to take the evidence in the case of the London Loan and Savings Company to recover \$2,051.40, alleged due on oil lands near Petrolia, which it is said that John Josh agreed to buy in 1905. He was to pay \$4,750 in monthly installments, but found that he could not make the lands pay, and alleged that the plaintiffs said he must give up possession.

Josh is at present drifting for oil in Egypt and does not expect to be back in Canada for two years. The evidence will be taken at Suiz.

THREE WORKMEN FATALY SCALDED

Foolhardy Act of Opening Boiler Responsible for Terrible Accident.

Halifax, Feb. 22.—Three Poles were fatally scalded and a French-Canadian named Alexander Goyette, discharged for life, when one of the workmen at the Borden pulp mill opened one of the plugs of a boiler.

There was an instantaneous outburst of steam and boiling water, and three Poles who were standing close by were immediately scalded to death and beyond recognition. Another workman, a French-Canadian, named Alexandre Goyette, was terribly disfigured. One of his arms was torn out, and the whole side of his body was horribly scorched. He was conveyed to the Halifax Hospital, where he lies in a critical condition.

NICE FOR TRAVERS

Dines in Restaurant and Has a Walk Around Town.

Toronto, Feb. 22.—A reporter saw W. R. Travers in the custody of two detectives Tuesday evening in a Queen street restaurant.

After supper they had a walk around town and were seen later on Yonge street.
