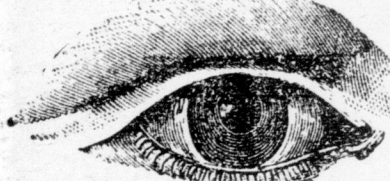

"STAY IN ONTARIO"

A Great Field of Wheat—Phenomenal Yield of 40 Bushels to Acre



Every stalk loaded to the tip with heavy grain, the wheat raised on a nine and half acre field on the farm of Mr. Charles Wonnacott, lot 9, concession 4, Delaware Township, is regarded as a remarkable crop. It will yield fully forty bushels to the acre; some venture that parts of the crop will run forty-five bushels to the acre. To the city man it might be explained that twenty-five bushels to the acre is a good crop, thirty is considered unusual, thirty-five excellent, and forty phenomenal.

Mr. Wonnacott, who is shown in the picture, is a strong "Stay in Ontario" advocate. He believes agriculture is coming to a high state of development in this section, and that advanced means will bring great returns. This record crop produced two continuous rows of shocks every fourth row of the binder. It has been examined by scores.

HYDRO PATRONS WANT REBATES FOR BREAKDOWNS

Power Commission Writes That Complaints Will Be Considered Later.

St. Mary's Council Advised To Make Minimum Rate for Lights.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Marys, Aug. 2. — At the regular meeting last night of the water, light and heat board, Chairman Curran stated that a number of power users were asking rebates for time lost during the hydro breakdowns.

The secretary presented a communication from the Ontario hydro-electric power commission asking for a statement of the June bill. It was stated that complaints would be considered later.

H. W. Page, Wellington street, wrote, asking for a water service for lawn and house with water meter; granted.

The Ontario hydro-electric power commission wrote advising the local board to have a minimum charge of 50 cents per month for electric light.

New Water Mains. Secretary Miller presented estimates of new water mains required, principally in the south end of the town. The main asked for running to the Coleman subdivision section must have service to annually pay 10 per cent on the expenditure and the users sign contracts to that effect before the request will be granted.

About \$220 will be expended on water main extensions on the south side of Queen street to supply water services, and the amount to be charged up to capital account.

The secretary will make an estimate of the water main to Miss King's residence in the west ward report.

Accounts Passed. Accounts amounting to \$484.42 were passed. The board agreed to have the brickwork under the steam boiler repaired, and the secretary will order materials necessary for the boiler from the States.

The secretary was instructed to make drafts through the banks on all those who are in arrears for water and light.

In connection with the writ issued against members of the water and light board by J. W. Graham because water and light were cut off, the board instructed the secretary to deduct J. W. Graham's contra account, and ask a settlement of the balance of the account due the board.

STRONG PROTEST FROM MEAFORD OVER LICENSES

Clear Case of Deception, and Political Trickery, Say Conservatives.

Deputation Will Take Up the Matter With Mr. Hanna.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Meaford, Aug. 2. — Dissatisfaction both among Conservative and Liberal temperance men is rife in Meaford over the reissuing of the local licenses by the provincial secretary's department. The question is not being treated from a party viewpoint and some of the most vigorous protests are expressed openly by men who are well-known Conservatives. A private deputation will probably go from here to interview Hon. W. J. Hanna and to express to him personally the widespread feeling of opposition.

Conservatives Displeased. "A clear case of deception," and "Political jockeying," are two expressions against the Government heard today from Conservatives. For one thing, they do not like the statement issued by the department. To read it one would think that the temperance men had been pleased to accept the Government's proposition to reissue the licenses on condition that another local option vote was to be held next January.

As a matter of fact this arrangement was accepted under protest, and only because the Government left the temperance people nothing else to do.

Reissue Licenses. They were told that the licenses were going to be reissued at any rate, deeded by Hon. J. W. Hanna's promise, and against their renewal. If this order had not been rescinded after the North Grey election and the victory of the Conservative candidate, on whose behalf the promise of a reissue of the licenses was whispered about, Meaford today would have been without bars. August 1 was the date previously fixed for the closing by the Government before they had changed their minds and decided to renew the licenses.

ANOTHER VICTIM

Nine Are Now Dead as a Result of a Motorcycle Accident.

[Canadian Press.] Cincinnati, Aug. 2. — The list of fatalities resulting from the motorcycle accident at the Ludlow, Ky., lagoon last Wednesday night, was increased to nine today, when Michael Carney, of Lima, Ohio, succumbed to his burns. Two others, a woman and a boy, are still in a precarious condition, and are not expected to recover.

The case of the three men killed for voluntary manslaughter in connection with the accident, came up in the Covington police court this morning, when Manager Eberhart, of the motordrome; Manager Wilbur, of the park, and Representative Rusch, of the Motordrome League.

PRINCE HENRY TO BE NEW BOY AT ETON COLLEGE

King's Third Son Will Be First Royal Pupil of Famous School.

Will Have to "Fag," and Is To Be Treated Just Like Others.

[Canadian Press.] New York, Aug. 2. — A London cable says:

When Etonians reassemble in September after the summer vacation for the winter "half," the famous old public school for the first time in its history will have as a pupil the son of the King of England.

The "new boy" will be Prince Henry, the third son of the King and Queen, who is 13 years old, and until this summer has been at St. Peter's Court School, Broadstairs.

Just Like Others.

When the King, on his recent journey to Eton, announced his intention of sending Prince Henry to the school, it was understood that the prince would reside at Windsor, but he is really to be attached to the house of a house-master as soon as he arrives. This is in accordance with the King's special wish that he should be treated like every other boy.

Prince Henry will start in the "Middle Fourth," the average "form" for boys entering Eton.

Will Have to Fag.

Rising at 6:45 a.m., on school days, he will have to be in school by 7:30 a.m. On full school days he will have to do six hours' work a day, and four hours' work on half-holidays. Like all the lower boys, he will have to "fag" for upper class students, that is, run messages.

The question that is troubling the Eton boys above everything else concerned with the "new boy" is what they shall call him when he gets settled among them. Shall it be "Prince Henry" or plain, simple Henry or Harry, as he has been called by his schoolfellows at St. Peter's Court.

Prince George of Teck, King George's nephew, is at Eton, and is always called "Teck" by the other boys, and those who are intimate with him call him simply George.

LAYMEN'S ASSN. PLANS GREAT ONTARIO CANVASS

Every Protestant Church North of Mexico To Take Part In Campaign.

Toronto, Aug. 2. — Mr. H. K. Caskey, secretary of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, has just returned from a leaders' conference on the missionary campaign which was held at Lake Geneva, Mich.

Mr. Caskey says that the United States is co-operating with Canada in the every-member canvass which will take place in Canada and in the United States in 1914. This means that practically every Protestant church north of Mexico will be at work on the same thing at the same time. "It is the greatest example of church union ever given in the country," said Mr. Caskey. "The simultaneous every-member canvass," said the speaker, "is but a carrying into church life the efficiency methods of business. Over the whole country only half of the 20,000,000 Protestant church members give to missions. They are all ready to give their support to their own portion, but not all are sufficiently unselfish to see their money used to have preachers go to peoples who cannot get religious instruction in any other way. The plan which has been worked out in two denominations of the country provides that on a certain week every member of the church all over the nation shall be

asked to pledge some regular amount to mission work."

Teams for Instruction. Instruction work will be given, said Mr. Caskey, by teams of men, who will visit various centres and will confer with local church men. A large number of these conferences have already been arranged for Canada, and if possible the number will be augmented. The conference which has just concluded at Lake Geneva was attended by members from fourteen states of the republic, and foreign mission countries represented included India, South America, Japan, Philippines, China and the Straits Settlements. Mr. J. Campbell White, of New York, and Judge Selwyn Spencer, of St. Louis, were among the speakers.

HURLED FROM RIG BY COLLISION WITH CAR

Thamesford Man and Sister in an Accident on Dundas Street.

Mr. Jack Lawrence, of Thamesford, and his sister, were thrown out of their rig by colliding with a street car at the corner of Dundas and Maitland streets, last night, about six o'clock. The lady was thrown out on her head, and for the mass of hair might have sustained serious injury. They were driving down the street behind an automobile, when, in attempting to pass, they came too near the car tracks. The car was coming along at a good speed and the step struck the hub of the wheel, breaking it off, and precipitating the occupants into the road. The horse was a quiet one and did not run away, or the accident might have been more serious.

UNITED STATES AGENT ARRESTED FOR BLACKMAIL

Alleged To Have Threatened Arrest of Former Mexican Governor.

New Orleans, Aug. 2. — A sensation has been caused in Latin-American revolutionary and Government circles by the arrest here during the night of G. Raymond Matthews, special agent of the United States department of justice, J. L. Mott, his assistant, and Ernesto Fernandez Y. Arteaga, representative here of the constitutional party in Mexico, on the charge of blackmail.

The arrests resulted from an appeal to the local police by Emmanuel Brito, former governor of the State of Campeche, Mexico, who stated that he had been approached by one of the agents with the copy of a telegram which purported to have come from Washington, signed McReynolds, ordering Brito's arrest.

Brito says he was informed that \$500 would extract him from the situation. At this juncture he apprised local detectives. All concerned met at 1223 St. Charles avenue last night, where the arrests followed.

Assistant Chief of Detectives Daniel Mooney, who filed the charges, said he found \$500 in marked bills on Matthews.

Former Governor Brito arrived in New Orleans several days ago from Mexico, accompanied by several of his staff. Fernandez Y. Arteaga has been here some time as the personal representative of Gen. Garza, head of the Mexico constitutionalists. He is reputed to be wealthy.

United States Attorney Walter Gulon admitted that he had received a telegram ordering the arrest of a "certain person." He said he has shown this telegram to Special Agent Matthews. When questioned Matthews denied having seen the message. Mr. Gulon refused to disclose the name of the person to be arrested.

CUTTING OATS

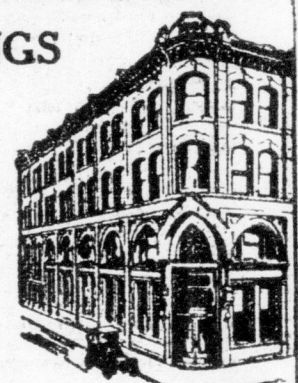
