FRENCH MAKE ANOTHER GAIN SOMME FRONT

Russians Storm Heights In Carpathians Taking 500 Prisoners and Guns Emergency Accommodation

Slavs Continue to Make Steady Progress Again in Galicia Despite Stubborn Resistance by Germans, Austrians and Turks.

Petrograd, Sept. 9 .- In the Carpathians, south of Baranoff, the Russians stormed a series of heights. They took 500 prisoners, the announcement says, and captured a mountain battery of several can-non, which had been thrown into the ravines.

STUBBORN FIGHTING. Petrograd, Sept. 9.—Via London, 2:50 p.m.—German and Turkish troops are engaged in stubborn fighting with Russian forces in Galicia on the River Naraiuvka, in the direction of Halicz, according to the official statement issued today by the Russian war office. A counterattack made by the Turks and Teutons, the statement adds, was repulsed by the Russians.
