OPEN CAMPAIGN TO SECURE \$500

Thorndale Women's Institute
Work To Endow Cot in Children's Hospital.

THORNDALE, Oct. 18.—The Thorndale Women's Institute are endeavoring to raise \$500 for the Children's War Memorial Hospital, London, in order that West Nissouri Township may have a cot.

Women have been appointed in the different wards of the township to take charge of the collecting, and all residents of West Nissouri will be interviewed.

The Thorndale branch of the Women's Institute, under the presidency of Mrs. Bolton Fitzgerald, has accomplished very creditable work.

In August, 1921, the work of improving the five township cemeteries was undertaken, and, due largely to the tactful and energetic leadership of Mrs. Fitzgerald, the co-operation of the plot-holders and trustees of the various cemeteries was received.

Financial aid has also been rendered each year to the public library, and every effort is made to apply the institute motto, "For Home and Country."

EXPECT DISCUSSION ON LIMITING ARMAMENTS

OTTAWA, Oct. 18.—(By Canadian Press.)—Following the meeting of the meeting it was said that "routine business" had been taken up.

Another meeting will be held tomorrow afternoon at which it is expected, some important matters will come up for consideration. It is understood that Canada's negotiations for a treaty with the United States, limiting naval armaments on the great lakes were not discussed this afternoon, but there are indications that they will be taken up either tomorrow or in the near future.

The arrangement of the matter having been left to Canada, it devolves upon the government to select a minister to conduct negotiations on behalf of the Dominion.

Churchill Operated On For Appendicitis.

LONDON, Oct. 18.—Winston Spencer Churchill, secretary of state for the colonies, was operated on for appendicitis this evening. The operation is declared to have been successful, and Mr. Churchill is progressing favorably.

The colonial secretary has been suffering for several days from what has been described variously as gastro-enteritis and gastritis, and from this condition appendicitis developed last night.

CAPTURED TRIO REFUSE TO TALK ON JAIL ESCAPE

Herbert Wilson and Pals Are Taken Without a Struggle.

TO OPEN INVESTIGATION

California Police Officials Will Try To Solve Mystery.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 18.—The first apparent result of the recapture early today of the three bandits who broke out of Los Angeles county jail yesterday was the sending of one of them—Adam Blaszk, alias Ward—a convicted murderer—to San Quentin Penitentiary to serve a life sentence for strangling Mrs. Nancy M. Wheeler in a robbery. The other two, Herbert Wilson, leader in the break for freedom, former evangelist, alleged mail robber and convicted murderer, and Guido Spignola, alias "the Mouse," accused of robbing the Los Angeles office of the Standard Oil Company of \$33,000, were guarded carefully in the county jail, from which they were absent just one day.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Oct. 18.—Smashing open the rear door of the home of Tom Garwood, well known to the authorities, Detective-Sergeants Katzenberger and Stelzriede and Capt. Hotz of the sheriff's office, captured Herbert Wilson, convicted murderer, Adam Ward, convicted murderer, and Guido Spignola, alleged "master bandit," a few minutes after dawn today. The three were taken in custody just 24 hours after they had staged one of the most sensational jail breaks in the history of California, in which they beat one jailer until he fell unconscious, and outwitted two others who were in the jail at the time.

The capture of the three desperadoes was effected without a struggle after the officers had lurked in the shadows of the place all night. But the reason for this was simple. Wilson had seen the officers for more than an hour before they broke in. He saw that he and his pals were outnumbered, and realized that it would be suicide to put up a fight.

When Stelzriede, Katzenberger and Hotz broke into the house the notorious bandit and all-around crook, Wilson, came towards them smiling, his hands in the air. "We are willing to go along," he said. "There will be no bloodshed and no shooting."

Officers Surprised.
The officers marveled at this, as they had been promised by Wilson, in a message sent to the sheriff, that his escape, that he would "shoot" with any officers that might corner them.

As soon as the prisoners had been returned to county jail, an investigation into facts surrounding their escape was started by the sheriff and the district attorney's office. The three men were questioned, and while they willingly told all about their experiences after they had gained their freedom, they refused to make any statements concerning their escape.

When questioned along this line Wilson said: "Why tell all about how I succeeded in the jail break and get many others into trouble? Will I gain anything by that?" Ward and "the Mouse" would do just as Wilson tells them, the officers are convinced, as they look upon the man as their leader. Wilson's first question as he was taken into the sheriff's office before being taken to the county jail, was directed to deputy sheriff Patton. "Mr. Patton," he said, "how is Mr. Purrier?" He was assured the deputy whom he rendered unconscious yesterday just prior to leaving the jail with his two companions was "all right."

Wilson discussed the escape freely, but not in detail. He said he had indicated to the officers that any persons connected with the jail were involved in the jail delivery plot.

Goes to Garwood Home.
Wilson told the officers that he had awakened shortly before 5 o'clock this morning and had awakened his companions. They were then preparing to leave the city early. While dressing, Wilson walked to the window and looked out. He said he saw at least half a score of men lurking in the shadows near the house. He watched closely until daylight, and then after viewing all the men, decided it would be foolish to engage in a gun battle, as the odds against him and his two companions were too great. The three men reached the Garwood home about 9 o'clock last night, and went at once to bed.

It was not until late last night that the sheriff decided to go to the Garwood home with a number of deputies and police officers.

Sheriff Trager said that he learned that when Wilson had planned to break jail several weeks ago, he had planned to go to the home of Garwood. Last night, while searching, they found the automobile that was stolen by the three men, abandoned near the Garwood home. The officers decided they would surround the house and wait until daylight before attempting to capture them.

When the prisoners arrived at the sheriff's office and when Wilson was asked to pose for a newspaper photographer he readily consented, after a reporter had loaned him a collar and necktie.

So far the man has carefully evaded answering any questions concerning the manner in which the guns were smuggled into the jail to him and his companions.

Prisoner Satisfied.
Spignola, "the Mouse," and Ward are content to allow Wilson to do all the talking. That they regard him as their leader is evidenced by their actions in refusing to talk. Just once Ward ventured a remark, but was silenced when "the Mouse" directed an angry glance in his direction and said, "Let Wilson do the talking."

The three prisoners expressed themselves as satisfied that they had not seriously injured anyone in their escape. They told officers that they had planned not to injure anyone and to submit to capture rather than add murder to their already long list of crimes.

Wilson maintains his attitude of calmness in the face of his interview. His two companions are plainly affected by his manner and are also remaining calm, although it is noticed that Ward is extremely nervous.

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her charged that Ald. Hartung had a third interest in the Boehmer property when the transfer was made of the ten-foot strip.

The litigation involves a mooted point which has been fought out in the city council during the summer and fall, and was brought about by the opposition of Alderman Hagedorn, who claimed that the city hall was being so placed on the site as to create a business street in front of the ten-foot strip, claimed by the Boehmer property. Ald. Hartung emphatically denies that he has any interest in the Boehmer property, and states that the transfer of the ten-foot strip to the Boehmer property by E. E. Bowman was made before he sold his hotel to the city. He also claims that the deed of the transfer was not registered, however, until after the vote of the people was taken at New Year's authorizing the purchase of the hotel. Just when the action will be heard is not determined. E. E. Bowman and W. H. Rosenbush have also been served with writs in the case.
