St. George's Little Church in East London Marks Anniversary.

OLDEST MEMBER

The birth of the twentieth century also marked the birth of a new church in this city. Ere one realized that a small mission had outgrown its field of work in East London, St. George's Presbyterian church was

established.
With the birth of the new church came the forming of an organization hitherto unknown in the locality, and the women of the congregation rallied to form their societies. The first to be fully organized was the ladies' aid, which since that time has been ever active and helpful to the church

ever active and helpful to the church and community.

Leadership for the young organization was not lacking. When the officers were elected, Mrs. S. Taylor, who recently moved to Detroit, was found to be just the woman to lead other women. She was appointed to the presidency in 1901, and held that office for one year.

The following year Mrs. George Cairneross was elected to the position, and since that time she has headed the organization, each year going back into office by the wishes of the members. In the twenty-two years that Mrs. Cairneross has been at the head of the ladies' aid it has steadily progressed, until now it is

at the head of the ladies and it has steadily progressed, until now it is one of the best in the city, though the church is not a large one.

22 Years Secretary.

Many of the dear friends of the president pledged their assistance to Mrs. Cairneross, and a few names are substantialized in the society. Among Mrs. Cairneross, and a few names are outstanding in the society. Among them is that of Mrs. John Little, who for the past 22 years has been secretary of the society, faithfully recording the successes of the organization. Others associated with the early days of the aid are the Misses M. A. and Ada Isaacs, Miss Margaret Buchanan, Mrs. James Pomeroy, who

was the first organist of the church.

These women have been and are still very active members of the still very active members of the ladies' aid, ever loyal to their leader. Others who were faithful members and who have moved away or passed to higher service, are the late Mrs. George Ross and the late Miss Isabel Cairneross.

The president has not only been head of the ladies' aid, but also the mother of the church itself. Her untiring efforts have always been for the good of the church as well as for her society and its members.

The organization has always been rective in supporting needs of the active in supporting needs of the church and in aiding both the pastors and the board of managers. Included

in the list of its activities is the assistance it gave in instaling the present organ, and also in decorating the church and manse. Oldest Presbyterian. The society has also the honor of having as a member the oldest member of the Presbyterian church in the London presbytery. This grand old lady is Mrs. Grace Isaacs, who is in

her 95th year. Both Mrs. Isaacs' daughters and granddaughters assist her in taking an active part in all organizations of the church. St. George's church can also claim one of the best choirs in the city for its size, and its able director is a woman, Miss Helen Angus Miss Angus has led the singers for many
