

DUBLIN IS SCENE OF MASS MEETING OF REPUBLICANS

Delegates Demand Immediate Release of All Political Prisoners.

1,500 IN ATTENDANCE

Dublin, Oct. 16.—Mention of the name of Eamon De Valera was greeted with prolonged cheering at the opening session of the Ard Fheis, or general assembly of the Sinn Féin, which met today at the Mansion House. About 1,500 delegates, representing 750 Sinn Féin clubs in all parts of Ireland, filled the round room in the building, the attendance including a few members of the clergy. Dr. Kathleen Lynn, who was elected a republican deputy from South Dublin in the recent election, called the meeting to order. The assembly voted to make Miss Mary MacSwiney chairman of the convention in place of Mr. De Valera. The agenda contains questions dealing with the release of political prisoners and the demand for the release of the republicans in the six counties of Ulster, and still another contains a strong protest against the use of their spiritual power by the Irish hierarchy, especially the denial of the sacrament to republicans and soldiers of the republic dying of wounds received in defence of the republic, and also the refusal to permit the bodies of republicans to be brought into church.

A copy of the resolution will be sent to Pope Pius with the prayer that he exclude politics of every kind from the pulpit.

The unconditional release of Eamon De Valera and all political prisoners is demanded in another resolution, which likewise congratulates De Valera on "his miraculous escape from attempted assassination at Ennis."

PARKHILL MAN IS FATALLY HURT WHEN MACHINE FALLS

LARGE BARN BURNS AND CAUSES \$10,000 LOSS

Midway, Oct. 16.—The large barn of Philip Montague, one mile from Formosa, was totally destroyed by fire last Saturday afternoon, with the entire season's crop, some calves and implements.

Mr. Montague's son was doing some chopping in the barn, using a gasoline engine. While the boy was in the granary getting a box of oats to put in the chopper the engine commenced to back-fire and when he returned the interior was ablaze. He immediately called for help and saved what stock and implements he could. The loss is estimated at \$10,000, partly covered by insurance. The barn was one of the largest and most modern in this vicinity.

PORT STANLEY MAN FIRED WHEN HE SHOTS COON

Pond at Aylmer Becomes Sanctuary For Wild Ducks

Aylmer, Oct. 16.—White's Pond at Springwater, just west and south of Aylmer, is fast becoming known to wild ducks, far and near, as a place where they may eat and rest in safety.

For years past in the fall of the year ducks have made an effort to land and feed at the pond, but they hardly spent a night there before some of the sportsmen went gunning for them. But Fred and Edward White, owners of the pond, are bird lovers and this year placed signs on their property requesting that the birds be protected, and they have asked the sportsmen to assist them in making the beautiful sheet of water a sanctuary.

The brothers have been feeding the birds for the past three weeks. A few of them have already become so tame that they may be fed out of the hand. More birds are coming every day. The pond is surrounded by woods on all sides, and the location is most suitable. The public is invited to visit the pond and see the birds.

Serve Hot Meals To Delhi Pupils

Delhi, Oct. 15.—The Women's Institute of Delhi has completed arrangements for serving hot lunches at the Delhi school every day at noon.

The thirty or forty students coming in from the rural district will bring their lunches as usual but will be served with hot soup, cocoa and other foods easily prepared. This idea was put into action because that rural students, who were eating cold lunches were not so efficient during the afternoon session as the students who live in town and get hot noon meals.

The public was invited to a shower held in the municipal building after school on Saturday afternoon, and the institute was the recipient of a generous supply of food-stuffs essential to stock the school larder.

Parents sending children to the school have expressed gratitude to the women behind this work.

CHARGED WITH THEFT, FARMER IS ACQUITTED

Keppel Township Man Freed When Accused of Stealing Potatoes.

Owen Sound, Oct. 16.—Angus Cameron, residing in Owen Sound, but the owner of a 50-acre farm on concession 3, Keppel Township, appeared in police court this morning to answer a charge of theft of seven bags of potatoes preferred against him by Harry Lemon.

Cameron was acquitted by the magistrate after nearly two hours' evidence had been submitted. Magistrate Creaser remarked that it was pretty hard for anyone to identify potatoes, and that he could not convict Cameron on the evidence. Crown-Attorney Dyer prosecuted and W. S. Middlebro, K.C., acted for the defence.

The offence was alleged to have been committed early Saturday morning on Mr. Lemon's farm. Tracks were seen leading from the farm, but no proof was forthcoming as to their ultimate destination. Counsel for the defence agreed that the potatoes had been stolen, but it was not proved who was the perpetrator.

Two half-sacks of potatoes were found in Cameron's house, and Mr. Lemon claimed they had come from his farm but Mr. Cameron said he had brought them in from his farm on Friday evening. The defence presented evidence to show that Cameron had not been out of his house from 8:30 p.m. Friday until Saturday morning.

CARS STOLEN IN KINCARDINE SINCE JULY TOTAL SEVEN

Kincardine, Oct. 16.—Edward Harrison, 10th concession Huron township, had his car stolen Sunday night. He, with three friends, drove into Kincardine to attend the evangelistic services at Knox Presbyterian Church, and parked the car on Park street near the church. This is the seventh car stolen in this town since July. All have been found abandoned around the town or the nearby country.

INJURED BY TRUCK, SUES FOR \$10,000

A. McKeracher of St. Thomas Asks Damages As Result of Accident.

St. Thomas, Oct. 16.—The civil court for the fall assizes which begins Oct. 21 consists of three cases, of which the most important is Harry A. McKeracher versus Standard Paving Company Limited, the Corporation of St. Thomas, and John and Louis Litvak. The suit calls for \$10,000 damages, together with \$950 for lost time, bicycle, hospital expenses, nurses' fee and doctor's expenses.

Mr. McKeracher was riding home from the Y. M. C. A., where he was employed as a physical director, on the 22nd Oct. 1922, and at the Wellington-Elgin street intersection was struck by a truck driven by Louis Litvak. He was severely injured, and lost the sight of an eye. It is alleged that the accident was due to a quantity of gravel being left in the centre of the road by the construction company employed by the city.

Davidson & Davidson are appearing for the plaintiff, W. B. Doherty for the city, Clark, Swabey and Clark for the Standard Paving Company Limited, and C. St. Clair Leitch, K.C., for John and Louis Litvak.

Rosie Dunn, infant of Sylvester Dunn of Union, is claiming damages from Warren M. Lockwood to the extent of \$7,000 for injuries inflicted as a result of an auto accident on the Union Hill, due, it is alleged, to the reckless driving, on the 9th of April, 1923, R. H. McCannell is appearing for plaintiff, and Cameron, Grant and Cameron for the defendant.

The Employers' Liability Assurance Corporation Limited, and Percival Crawford of Aylmer are suing the Central Pipe Line Company for \$2,200 to cover damages to house and \$292 to furniture caused by the explosion of a natural gas on 18th February, 1923.

The explosion was due to the pipeline being out of repair, which allowed natural gas to escape into plaintiff's cellar. The gas ignited, and the explosion resulted, wrecking the house. W. H. Barnum is appearing for the plaintiff, and Kerr, McNevin & Kerr of Chatham for the defendant.

Breaks Bones of Foot.
The second bicycle accident of the day occurred at the corner of Elgin and Talbot street Monday night, when Herbert Harris, 14 Penwarden street, was thrown to the sidewalk when his wheel skidded. He suffered several broken bones in his foot.

Miss Myrtle Beal, who suffered a similar accident earlier in the day when a wheel of a loaded wagon passed over her chest, is reported to be recovering.

Faints In Court.
Three cases were disposed of at police court this morning in record time. Louis B. Precor, who created such a dramatic scene in court a week ago when charged with non-support, again fainted away in the dock, but the effect was not quite so sensational. Magistrate Maxwell asked him to produce bail as guarantee that he would remain in the city in the future. The surety was \$100, and the case was adjourned.

Abdo Abdo, the 16-year-old offender charged with stealing his father's car, was allowed to go with suspended sentence, on condition that he mend his ways in the future.

A local junk dealer was arraigned before the magistrate, and confessed to stealing cast iron to the value of \$10 from a resident of Talbot street. Restitution having been made the offender was let off on suspended sentence. His wife is in poor health.
