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**FIRST THREE QUARTERS SHOW AN INCREASE**

So doubt is being expressed in municipal circles about the qualification of Mr. John Ritter for the Town council. The Statutes covering the question of the qualifications of candidates require a declaration from the candidate that he is not a citizen of the town for two years. Mr. Ritter was assessed on his business in Waterloo and pays a business tax. Two months ago he moved his business to Berlin. When he came to Berlin for the payment of taxes he was received by the collector. He considered that he should not be obliged to pay the full sum demanded. He offered to pay a part of the amount but this according to Statute could not be accepted by the Tax Collector. Mr. Ritter also claimed that he is not liable for the tax because he has offered to pay the bill. If the town council will immediately sue it, he said.

WATERLOO SEPARATE SCHOOL

Mr. F. O. Smith of Toronto re-elected Horatio Hocken as mayor, but the large vote polled for F. G. McRae, his 10-year-old opponent, shows that there is strong opposition in the city to the proposed purchase of the streetcar system from the stockholders and Mann interests. They voted Hocken 21,471; McRae 15,614.

Another feature of Toronto's campaign was the victory registered for the use of women's suffrage. A measure put before the electors asking them to favor the extension of the municipal franchise to the selected women who were otherwise qualified, was defeated yes, 26,288; no, 32,575, a majority of 13,712. The big majority was given to the proposal that the city end the dead meat trade and establish a sanitary bylaws favoring a grant of \$6,000 to the exhibition, and to two new hospitals, were decisively defeated.

Another feature of the election was the significant part played by the labor element, whose candidate, James Simps headed the poll for Board of Control.
