Fruit Inspection.-W. H. Lyne, fru inspector at Vancouver, makes the following statement respecting fruit importations from California: "We are not authorized to deal so much importations from California: "We are not authorized to deal so much with the actual condition of the fruit with regard to its being overripe or badly packed, as we are regarding fruit 'pests,' which this summer are principally the California peach worm (Anarsia linetella), the codlin moth larva (Carpocapsa pomonella), and the different scales. With regard to the forming of any plan on the part of the local fruit men as to their standing the loss of the condemned fruit, that lies entirely with themselves. They can insist that fruit be shipped to them subject to inspection of quarantine officer, at the shipper's risk, for whoever packs and ships the fruit is responsible for what is in it."
