# AIR LINE TO COLLINGWOOD

A Big Delegation Coming to Confer with  
the Members of Toronto's City Council.

Collingwood, Nov. 18.—Mayor Cal-  
lary, Reeve Nettleton and Frank Mor-  
rison, C.E., of Collingwood, when they  
to meet a number of the Toronto alder-  
men at the Queen's Hotel for the pur-  
pose of discussing the proposed air line  
to Ottawa. When all form a deputation to  
go to Ottawa to meet Minister Haggart  
on the 21st, and lay before him the  
whole scheme for the construction of an  
air line railway connecting Toronto and  
Collingwood. Several other munici-  
palities on the line of the proposed  
road send members of their bodies to  
accompany the deputation.  
The object of the visit is to obtain  
a subsidy from the Dominion Govern-  
ment.

## DOMINION COLD STORAGE CO.

An Important Meeting of the Directors in  
This City.

The directors of the Dominion Cold  
Storage Co. Ltd. held their first meet-  
ing on Friday, Nov. 15, in the parlour  
of the Queen's Hotel, there being pre-  
sented D. M. McPherson, Lancaster, in  
the chair; James McGregor and Wil-  
liam Johnston, Montreal; Dr. Sykes,  
Toronto; Dr. Lowery and George  
Foster, Brantford. Mr. D. M. Mc-  
Pherson was elected president and  
James McGregor a general man-  
ager.

A large volume of important busi-  
ness was transacted, and it was de-  
cided to at once construct the ware-  
houses in Montreal, Toronto and Bran-  
ford, and to erect, in response to the  
earnest solicitation of representative  
gentlemen from other business centres,  
a complete system of warehouses  
throughout the Dominion, and that an  
immediate enlargement of capital is  
necessary.

The grasp which the company has  
taken of the cold storage question com-  
mands the attention and confidence of  
the people. It is conceded that this  
enterprise will do more for the fur-  
therance of our agricultural interests than  
any movement of modern times. The  
company is meeting with the warmest  
welcome and support from producers,  
who, realising the business which the  
company will do, are among the largest  
subscribers to its stock.

## THE FIRE ENGINE QUESTION.

What Seems Necessary for Lower Insurance  
Rates.

The Fire and Light Committee yester-  
day decided to advertise for tenders to  
be opened in two weeks' time for two  
steam fire engines, one or both of  
which may be purchased. The speci-  
fications drawn up by Chief Graham  
call for a capacity in one engine of  
800 to 1000 gallons a minute; weight  
7000 pounds without supplies; in the  
other engine capacity 800 gallons and  
weight 5000 pounds. The bidder must  
state how soon delivery can be made.

Incidentally, Mr. Hubbard said it was  
unjust that the taxpayers should pay  
for their appliances while the insur-

Hospital in 1885. He was greatly be-  
lieved by all; and especially those who  
were severely wounded will never for-  
get his skillful treatment and kindly  
sympathetic manner, to which they  
owed in a great measure their recovery.  
His memory will be ever kept  
green in their hearts.

## THE SCHILLER HOUSE BURGLAR

And Other Petty Culpits Before the Police Magistrate.

William B. Sawdon, alias the "Kid," the nifty young man who stole Banty Russell's trophies from the Schiller House, where the Hyams jury were housed, in charge of several constables, pleaded guilty in the Police Court yesterday. He admitted having previously served terms in the jail, Central and penitentiary. Some of the stolen goods were found in his possession and in order that the remainder may be recovered, Sawdon was remanded for sentence until the 22nd inst.

The credit of Sawdon's capture and conviction is due to Detective Slemin, who last evening made what may prove to be another important arrest in the matter. J. F. Galster, jeweler, 276 King-street east, is in custody on a charge of receiving the goods, to the stealing of which Sawdon pleaded guilty. The portion of the goods which found in Galster's possession. ## A HUGGER IN HAMILTON.

His Arrest Secured by a Pinchy Young Woman Who Ran for a Policeman—A Happy Reunion.

Hamilton, Nov. 18.—At the Police Court this morning John Burk was sentenced to two months in jail for assaulting Annie Clark and Mable Marriott, and to one month for assaulting P. C. Tuck, who arrested him. As Miss Clark was walking home in Markland-street late on Saturday night, Burk grabbed the girl around the waist and neck. She screamed and her assailant ran away. Miss Marriott, who was returning home on James-street south, passed Burk and dashed followed her. The frightened girl boarded a street car, but got off after going a short distance, and started up MGNB-street. She passed Burk, hiding behind a tree, and then saw P. C. Tuck, who, with H. Galvin, chased the assailant and caught him. Burk punched the policeman, but the latter overcame him with his baton.
