URGES FARM WHERE VICTIMS OF DRUGS CAN BE TREATED

Dr. McConnell, Manitoba Administrator, Says Placing Addicts in Jail Is of No Use

WINNIPEG, Oct. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Establishment of a farm where drug users may be taken and treated and the advisability of allowing only one retail drug store to sell narcotics on a form of prescription provided by the administration of the law in this province, was advocated today by Dr. B. J. McConnell, administrator of the Narcotic Drugs Act in Manitoba.

He declared the situation in Manitoba was good in comparison with any other part of the Dominion or the United States. Dr. McConnell estimated the number of drug addicts in Winnipeg

HAD DRUGS IN HIS CELL

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Robert Louis, convicted serving an 18 months' sentence for being in possession of narcotic drugs, was today sentenced to an additional year by Judge Perrault, who ascertained that he had had another supply secreted in his cell at Bordeaux jail.

There are approximately 15 in prison at the present time, but the system of placing narcotic users in jail is futile and has shown itself powerless to obtain permanent quarters. The proposition to buy and equip a farm for the housing of drug addicts would cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000, and it is hoped to get the co-operation of both provincial and federal governments.

Wars on Klu Klux

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 30.—Richard J. Hopkins, state attorney-general, has been instructed to institute immediate action to expel every official of the Ku Klux Klan from State of Kansas. The instructions came from Governor Henry J. Allen.

In a speech delivered Saturday night the governor denounced the Klan as a secret order operating without obeying the laws of the state by seeking a charter through the secretary of state as other fraternal organizations have done.

SOFT COAL FIRE STARTS BLAZE AT COLLEGIATE

CLINTON, Oct. 30.—Fire was discovered on the roof of the Collegiate Institute this morning, just as the pupils were gathering at 9 o'clock. The firemen responded promptly, and with good water pressure were able to extinguish the blaze in short order. It is not clear whether the cause was a spark from the chimney or a defective chimney. Soft coal is being burned at the school.

THREAT TO TAKE ROAD FROM HYDRO

Windsor Committee Sends Ultimatum to Sir Adam

ASKS FINANCIAL REPORT

WINDSOR, Oct. 30.—(Canadian Press Dispatch).—Following a special meeting to-day members of the transportation committee of the City Council forwarded a letter to Sir Adam Beck threatening to withdraw the street railway from the jurisdiction of the hydro if the increase in cash fares, scheduled to become effective on Wednesday, is not postponed until a statement showing the condition of the road's finances, is submitted to the Council.

Some time ago the commission announced the necessity of securing more revenue. Sir Adam Beck, during a recent visit to the city, suggested that cash fares be increased from 5 cents to 6 cents and that regular patrons of the lines be permitted to travel at the old

rate provided they purchase a dollar's worth of tickets.

ASKS FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The Council declined to approve the increase until a financial statement showing the need of it was furnished. Sir Adam Beck wired what was considered a refusal to delay the introduction of the new schedule on Saturday.

Sir Adam's message to Mayor Wilson was as follows: "At a meeting of the municipalities interested, held in Windsor, two weeks ago, at which you were present, necessity of increased revenue or reduction in wages was fully explained and the matter of 20 tickets for one dollar, 4 cents drop fare, and discontinuance of transfer charge was agreed to, without dissenting voice."

LAST POST FUND WELL SUPPORTED

Army and Navy Veterans of London Give Two Lots

BRANCH HERE IS PLANNED

Provincial Board, With Headquarters in Toronto, Suggested

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—Considerable progress towards establishing the Last Post fund throughout the Dominion has already been made as shown in a report made to the executive by A. H. D. Hare, Dominion organizing secretary, who has recently returned from a tour in Ontario.

This tour included Toronto, Windsor, London, Hamilton, Kingston and Ottawa and as a result practical steps have been made towards direct representation in various forms.

It is the intention to form a provincial board to assume charge of matters in Ontario and this will be placed in Toronto, where effective steps have been taken towards the organization. There will be a branch in London and direct representation from Windsor, Hamilton, it is anticipated, will keep the Government has allotted to the Ontario board \$1,000 for the work and this sum has been placed in the hands of the trustees.

At London the Army and Navy Veterans handed to the care of the Last Post fund two lots held by them in the Roman Catholic and Protestant cemeteries.

LONG CRIMINAL LIST AT BORDER

Judge Lennox Says Docket Shows "Serious Condition"

OFFENCES AGAINST WOMEN

Registrar Has Big Job Reading Naturalization List

WINDSOR, Oct. 30.—Confronted with a long list of criminal cases, including one of murder and five for offences against women, Mr. Justice P. Lennox, at Sandwich, this afternoon, when instructing the grand jury, asserted that such a docket indicated a "very serious condition along the border."

In commenting further on the evidence of much crime, the judge explained that he did not mean to cast any reflection on administrators of justice for these conditions.

"I will not blame any one thing for the condition," the court said, "although I might find it very easy." Those who were picked to serve on the grand jury are: A. Wright, W. W. Spencer, George A. Evans, Edward J. Joseph, Gustav, Joseph Kettwell, C. H. Knowlton, Fred. W. B. Moore, Robert Martin, A. L. Page, Charles A. Palmer, Louis Williams and Gordon Pilon.

Justice Lennox declined to hear application for naturalization until the name, age and place of birth of all applicants had been read aloud in court. Henry Clay, registrar of the court, was obliged to read 84 almost unpronounceable cognomens, the process requiring an hour.

GAMBLER ON SUNDAY

Eighteen men, five of them Detroiters, to-day were each fined \$5 and costs for violating the Lord's Day Act by gambling. They were arrested during a raid on a room in the Medbury block, Ouellette avenue and Sandwich street. Aaron Lindsay, Windsor contractor, was fined \$5 and costs when he admitted slapping his wife. She told the court that assault followed a complaint that dinner was not ready. Although Paul Soehalke, Langlois avenue, denied ownership of a jug of "moonshine," the police found in his back yard, he was taxed \$200 and costs for violating the Ontario Temperance Act.

FINED UNDER O. T. A.

Three local residents, one a woman, were fined for violating the O. T. A. Mrs. Pauline Leskovitch, 215 Langlois avenue, was fined \$50 and costs for having liquor unlawfully. She failed to give a satisfactory account of a quart of liquor police found when they raided her home. Urie Bertheaume and Louis Grant each paid a fine of \$50 and costs for being in possession of liquor.

BRUSSELS MERCHANT DIES AT TEA TABLE

George Thompson, Ex-Councillor and Leading Business Man, Passes Suddenly

BRUSSELS, Oct. 30.—George Thompson, grocer, a leading business man of Brussels for more than 40 years, died suddenly this evening while seated at the supper table. He had been at his store all day and appeared in his usual health.

The late Mr. Thompson was about 65 years of age. He served for several years in the Town Council and was a member of the Presbyterian Church. Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons and three daughters: George, in Toronto; James, in California; Mrs. Charles Dods, of British Columbia; Mrs. Garfield Long, of Niagara Falls, and Mrs. Cleve Baker, of this town.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

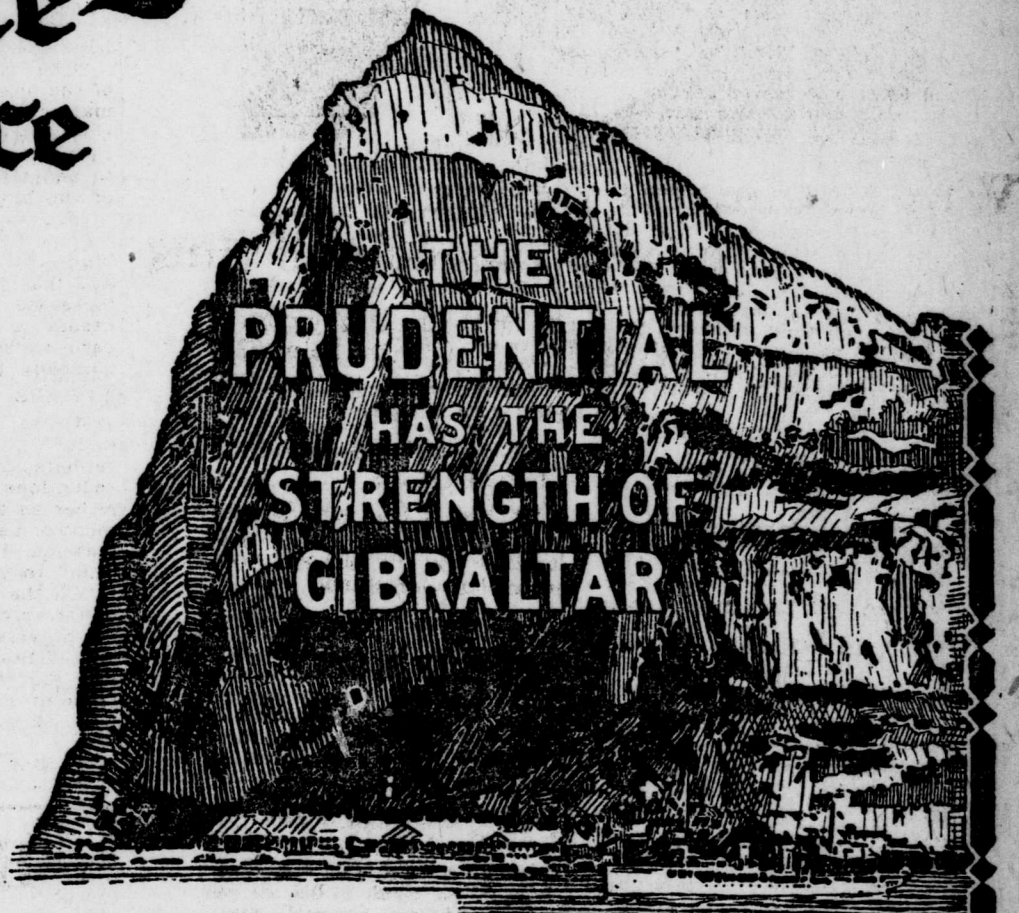

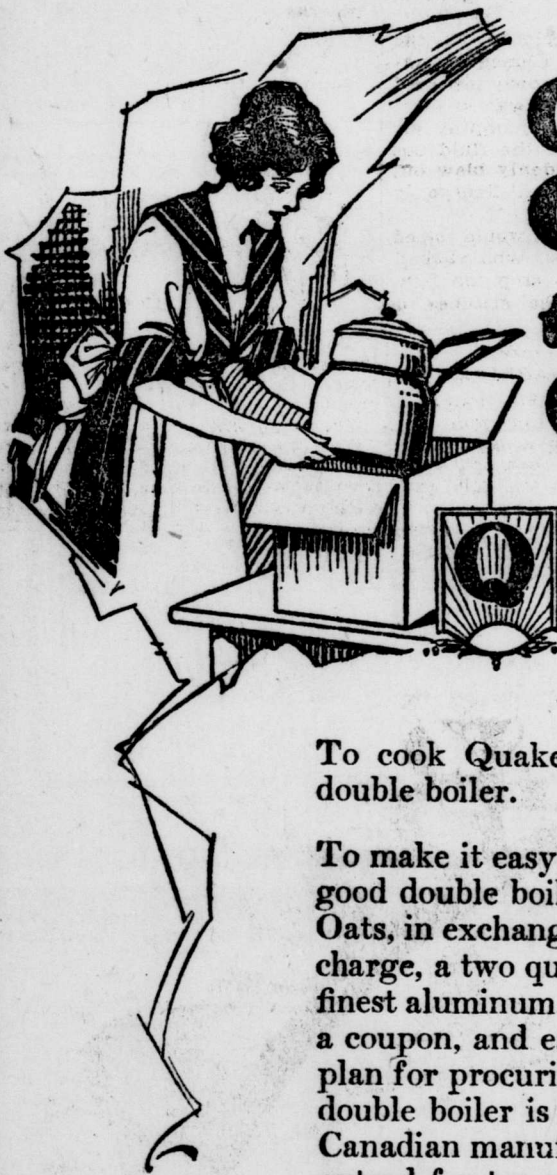
