New Method of Consumption For Low Grade Bituminous Coal Provides Perfect Combustion With Entire Elimination of Carbon-Efficiency of Fuel

Pulverized coal will be one of the factors that will solve the fuel problem for Canada in the near future, according to City Engineer Near. Mr. Near recently took advantage of an oppor tunity to take a trip through the Ford plant at Ford, Ont., and he was particularly interested in the power plant there in which pulverized coal is used entirely The fuel is burned so efficiently that there is no trouble from smoke as is noticed generally bituminous coal is used. though the pulverized coal is bituminous, the method of firing produces percombustion and the carbon and other substances are completely consumed within the firebox of the boilers. will not be many years until all the large steam plants in the country will be using this fuel, and it is not too much to expect that it will also be used for the heating of houses also. TO REMAIN STEADY

Is Now Selling At \$14 a Ton, According To Dealers.

COAL MEN HAVE PLENTY Any Increase In Price Depends On the Weather.

There is no immediate prospect of a ase in the price of coke in London, according to local coal dealers to-day. Coke is selling now for \$14 a ton and will most likely stay at that figure for some time. Many of the London dealers have plenty of coke on hand and those with low bins have cars ordered at prices which will allow them to sell at \$14. A good deal depends, as one ealer said, on the kind of weather we get for the next few weeks. "Coke is being bought now in Detroit for about \$11," said one dealer, "and we can continue to sell that here for \$14. It used to be \$7.50 in Detroit.

"Boosting buying simply fills bins in ouses to the full and reduces the supply available in dealers' yards for those oorer people who have to buy from nonth to month or week to week," say well-known coal dealer in the city. 'I do not expect a rise in coke prices, certainly not in my business.'
