## Marriageable Age of Children.

It will, perhaps, be news to many, that  
in England a boy and girl may contract a  
marriage at the age of 7, and that the mar-  
riage can only be avoided or finally ratified  
when the boy and girl reach the ages of 14  
and 12, respectively. The minimum ages of  
14 and 12, which are necessary for a legal  
and legal marriage, are also the minimum  
ages recognized in Spain and Portugal,  
Switzerland, Greece, and, for Roman Cath-  
olics only, in Hungary, Germany, France,  
Russia and Saxony do not recognize as legal  
marriages of boys under 18; whilst in  
France the bride must have courted at  
least fifteen summers, and in Russia twelve.

Turkey, perhaps, offers more facilities for  
the marriage of infants than any other  
European country. Turkish requirements  
are satisfied if bride and bridegroom are  
old enough to toddle from the cradle to the  
altar and to understand the meaning of the  
ceremony of marriage.

## The Budget in Brief.

No tariff revision till the November  
session.

BURFORD township is at present inter-  
ested in hidden treasure. It seems that  
men while excavating a cellar on the land  
of Squire Grey came upon a bottle con-  
taining document and a map giving the  
alleged location of buried treasure to the  
value of \$10,000. The treasure is said to  
have been buried in 1837, during the  
time of the rebellion. Squire Grey has  
forbidden anyone to search for it.

An exchange says men have various  
ways of carrying money. Grocers,  
butchers and millers carry it in a wad.  
Bankers in clean bills laid lengthwise in  
a pocket-book. Brokers always fold the  
bills once, doubling it, as it were, the  
young business man carries his in his vest  
pocket, while the sport carries his in his  
trouser pocket; the farmers and drovers  
in their inside pockets, whether it is \$50  
or 15c. Printers sometimes carry theirs  
in other people's pockets.

THE season thus far gives promise of a  
bountiful year for the dairy farmer. The  
recent rains have made the grass grow  
rapidly, and creamery directors state that  
within the past ten days the receipts of  
milk have been in advance of last year  
for the same period. Farmers realize the  
worth of the dairy, and it is hinted that  
several new creameries will be instituted  
in this and adjoining counties in time for  
next season's operations. Fully two-  
thirds of our farmers use hand separators.

By this method the skim milk is not only  
more wholesome as feed for the pigs and  
calves, but more cream is obtained from  
the milk. It also is more convenient for  
the farmer, as cream separated may be  
allowed to stand at home for two or three  
days while milk that is taken to the  
creamery must be delivered every day in  
the summer time.

## Monster Oil Well.

Tilbury, May 22.—At 4.30 today a mon-  
ster oil well was struck by Church, Norton  
and Bowly on the Harwood Marshall farm,  
six miles east of Tilbury, at a depth of  
1,370 feet. A flow of oil was encountered  
in the upper strata, which is flowing to-  
night at the rate of 100 barrels per day.  
In this territory, the second and third wells  
are much richer than the first. Drilling has  
been suspended pending the erection of  
several 250 barrel tanks. This is the fourth  
well in this territory and is by far the most  
productive producer. Oil men are very san-  
guine and are making desperate efforts to  
lease territory.

## Large Loaves.

The largest loaves of bread baked in the  
world are those of France and Italy. The  
"pipe" bread of Italy is baked in loaves two  
feet or three feet long, while in France the  
loaves are made in the shape of very long  
rolls, four feet or five feet in length, and in  
many cases six feet.

## Little Bell Biographies

**Haydn**  
FRANCIS JOSEPH HAYDN, born at Rohrau 1732, died at Vienna  
1809, was another of the 18th century musicians who became  
famous in their teens. His name is inseparably and popularly  
linked with that of George Frederick Handel in that mode of dramatic  
music called Oratorio. Handel is the composer of the incomparable  
"Messiah," and Haydn of the equally incomparable "Creation." This  
oratorio, written in his 60th year, is to-day as popular as 100 years ago.  
Haydn's compositions comprise almost every form of vocal and  
instrumental music, yet his chief distinction is not in oratorio. His  
rank in the musical world is determined by his service to instru-  
mental music. He fixed the form of the sonata and symphony  
which Beethoven (who called him "Papa" Haydn) perfected in  
beauty and expressiveness, for one thing substituting the light, gay  
Scherzo for Haydn's stately Minuets. As the musical father of  
Beethoven, Haydn is perhaps justly styled the father of classical  
instrumental music.

For the piano he composed 44 sonatas. The wonder is how in  
those days of the harpsichord, clavier and spinet—small and thin-voiced  
instruments—the composers could conceive and write sonatas the  
beauties of which could be revealed only by some such perfect instru-  
ment as
