will be studied in so far as they influence the removal of water by means of underdrains. Depths and grades of drains, distance between drains and capacity of tile will be dealt with. The study of the Ontario Drainage Laws will also be taken up.

This Course is specially designed for farmers and farmers' sons and will be limited to a class of twenty-five men. The Late Benjamin Evans.

The death of Benjamin Evans, a pioneer of Brockway township, occurred at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Walter Knapp, northeast of Yale, on Wednesday, February 28, 1917.

Benjamin Evans was born in Warwick, Lambton county, Ont., July 31st, 1836. In 1861 he was married to Evalina O'Dell and came to St. Clair Co. settling on a farm 1 mile north and 3 1/2 miles west of Yale, then Brockway Centre.

Ten children came to bless and make happy the home life, all living:—Cornelius, Sarah, Mrs. Walter Knapp, Yale; Morris, state of Washington; Elizabeth, Mrs. Charles Dudley, Black Duck, Minn.; Susan, New York city; Frank, St. Paul, Minn.; Evaline, Mrs. Van Dorn, New York city; Carrie, Mrs. Walter Williams, Sandusky; May, New York city; Isla, Mrs. Charles Clark, Springfield, Ohio.

Twenty-two years ago Mr. and Mrs. Evans moved to Yale and became identified with the public life, spirit and interests of the town beloved and respected citizens.

The wife and mother passed away March 2nd 1915, and soon after the home was broken up and Mr. Evans was taken to live with his daughter, Mrs. Knapp, on the farm about three miles northeast of Yale, where he passed his last days.

The funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at one o'clock from the home of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Knapp.

A Special Short Course in Farm Drainage

The practice of farm underdrainage has grown to such importance that it is now almost impossible to obtain the services of men having sufficient knowledge of drainage methods that they are capable of taking charge of the installation of a drainage system, either by hand or by machine.

The County Department of Agriculture, in co-operation with the Drainage Department of the Ontario Agricultural College, will hold a One Week Short Course in farm drainage, beginning Monday, March 26th, 1917, in the Agricultural Office, Petrolia.

OUTLINE OF WORK

Instruction will be given in home-made and standard types of surveying levels. Their care, construction, adjustment and use will be taken up in detail. Taking levels, map reading and map making will be followed by easy steps so as to be within the grasp of a beginner.

Lectures will cover the principals of drainage and various soil types
