There is reason to suppose that over great area in this country the motherrock contains large amounts of potash in forms unavailable as plant food and further that chlorine gas will unlock and render such potash active and beneficial to vegetation. Your committee propose to send samples and get advice from Ottawa on these two points. An affirmative answer to both would mean that over the said area an application of 2 cwt. of common salt would be equal to an application of 250 lbs. of that muriate of potash, which is now unobtainable, either from Germany or elsewhere.

On these conditions being proven, an apportunity for concerted action by your agricultural executive, would arise which would greatly aid in that production which we all concede is so essential.

These, Mr. Warden and gentlemen, of the Council, are some of the fields of endeavor, which your agricultural executive, when and if created, could cultivate and crop for the benefit of your ratepayers and your rateroll. They are respectfully submitted for your consideration.

Our County Hospital and Home have een carried on in an efficient manner, though with no changes in the staff of either Istitution, and the report of the Provincial Health Officer showing the condition and management of these Institutions to be second to none in the Province, is a high compliment to the faithful services of Mr. and Mrs. Hiltz, Mr. and Mrs. Myers, and their staff, as well as a source of pride to the committee in charge.

The hospital has for the greater part of the year been full of patients. While the County Home has been taxed to its full capacity, and the inmates of each Institution have received the same patient attention as

in the past. Owing to the increased cost of living and the efficient service given, the cost of maintaining these institetions is increasing, but by careful buyng and attention to details we have en able to keep the expenses for he year well within the Presentment. The County farm has again responded to the efforts of Mr. Myers and his vailable helpers, and we can report

he following crops grown: Hay, about 60 tons. Straw, about 4 tons. Turnips, about 500 bushels. Potatoes, about 600 bushels. Beans, about 40 bushels.

Oats, about 125 bushels. Buckwheat, about 10 bushels. Carrots, parsnips and beets, about Cabbage, 200 heads.
